REPLIES TO MR. JONES.

Judge Dupre insists that is High License of Additional Taxation.

Opelousas, La., March 22nd, 1908. To the Editor of the Clarion:—On the 29th of February, through your columns, I propounded to the opponents of our present system of High License and to the Members of the Board of Aldermen of this City, some of whom are also engaged in the same occupation, the following question:

"How are you going to run this City, the fifteen thousand dollars derived from the saloons being withdrawn?" This was four weeks ago, and by the time this appears in print, five issues of your paper will have gone to its readers without as much as an attempted reply.

The reason is obvious. All the wise heads in and out of the City Administration, are powerless to reply. They have concluded their best answer is by remaining silent. Well, gentlemen, you can adopt this method of reasoning, for I am not going to pattern after you. You must reply, else, I am going to do this for you.

I charge, as I have heretofore done, that it is this license money, or additional taxation. And I charge, and I am prepared to maintain, that additional taxation will not carry in this, or, in any other community in this parish.

If you know of any method whereby you can finance the City, other than by additionally taxing the people, pray give them to us. This will simplify your fight. Many well disposed voters might thereby be induced to join your ranks if they are made to believe you can maintain the present status of this City without the imposition of additional taxes.

But they are not going to blindly follow you, and rest content with the assertion "That something will have to be done."

What they desire to know is, what is that "Something?" What does it mean? "Come out in the open, gentlemen, and make your fight, else I am going to hammer away at you, until I convince the public of your insincerity. You have either to disclose your remedy, or stand convicted of your charge."

I have no idea that you are going to make any reply. I am going to give you people a few facts for them to digest before they "Kill the goose that lays the golden egg."

In a lengthy conversation had with Mayor Littell, he informed me that it was either High License, or additional taxation. He stated among other things: That the Electric Light and Water Works Plants had never been self-sustaining other than to the extent of paying its running expenses. That for every repair made, for every extension thereof, for every improvement had, the same had been brought about with the aid of the license fund. Not going back further than two years, I myself obtained from the books of the city the following evidence:

thousand dollars with which to meet an existing indebtedness for sidewalks, constructed during the year 1907. And examples such as these might be multiplied indefinitely.

And now a word by way of an answer to Mr. Jones' communication. I believe the above facts obtained from the records Mr. Jones has helped make, is a sufficient reply, but his was such an easy mark that I am inclined to go a little further and quoting again from Mayor Littell to assert:

"That the plant not only cannot maintain itself, but that it is totally inadequate to meet existing demands made upon it. That without the license fund to maintain it, or enlarge it, or additional taxation to bring about these necessities, we will within two years be without any plant at all."

This I submit is a nice state of affairs to contemplate. I am informed that what Mr. Jones meant to say, was this: Given a plant to cost twenty thousand dollars it could not only maintain itself, but create a surplus. But where obtain these twenty thousand dollars? "Aye there's the rub." Mr. Jones (if such was his meaning) prescribed a remedy beyond our reach. Come again, Mr. Jones; make a clear statement and refute if you can do so, the Mayor's statements and figures herein above given. There is much more from whence these were obtained. For want, however, of additional space, I am giving them to my opponents in broken doses only. Yours truly, GILBERT L. DUPRE.


