He has certainly proved a hustler in securing new members of the order and his promotion is well deserved."

CHARTER OF
The Progressive Building Co., Ltd.
State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Landry.
Be it known that on this 25th day of April A. D. 1908, before me the undersigned notary publicly commissioned and qualified in and for the parish of St. Landry, Louisiana, personally came and appeared the parties whose names are hereunto subscribed who severally declare that they do hereby form and organize themselves into a corporation for a term of fifty years from this date, under the name of "The Progressive Building Company Ltd., the domicile whereof is fixed in the Town of Arnaudville, St. Landry Parish, Louisiana, and its objects and purposes and business being to buy and sell real estate of all kinds, whether it be city or country property, to rent and lease the same, from or to, to improve the said properties, and in other words to do a general real estate business.
The capital stock shall be two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) divided into 500 shares of five dollars (\$5) each, which said stock shall be paid for in cash payable in installments of not less than one quarter of the amount subscribed for at any one time, or the same may be issued at not less than par, in payment or exchange for property or rights actually received or purchased by said corporation, or the same may be issued full paid for money advanced, and for such other valuable consideration or services as the Board of Directors of said corporation may determine.
The affairs shall be managed by a Board of Directors composed of five (5) stockholders to be elected annually by the stockholders by ballot, on the second Tuesday in July or any subsequent day fixed by the Board, in case of no election taking place on said day. Each share of stock shall be entitled to one vote. Said Board shall have the right to make all by-laws, and change and alter the same at pleasure.
