PROVOSTY ENDORSED BY OPELOUSAS BAR

Opelousas, La., July 3d, 1908.

A meeting of the Bar of the Parish of St. Landry held at the Court House at Opelousas, at 3 p. m., this day, the following members were present: E. T. Lewis, R. Lee Garland, W. J. Sandoz, E. P. Veazie, B. H. Pavy, J. R. Pavy, D. L. Guilbeau, Jno. N. Ogden, Morton H. Thompson, Robert Harry, L. Austin Fontenot, Leon S. Haas, Gilbert L. Dupre, A. H. Garland and E. B. Dubuison.

On motion duly seconded Judge E. T. Lewis was made the Chairman of the meeting, and E. B. Dubuison, Secretary. The Chairman stated that the purpose of the meeting was to give the Bar of this parish an opportunity to express their opinion on the candidacy of Mr. Justice O. O. Provosty for re-election as a Justice of the Supreme Court of this State. On motion duly seconded Messrs. W. J. Sandoz, R. Lee Garland and E. B. Dubuison were appointed a committee on resolutions. After a recess, the committee, through its chairman, submitted the following preamble and resolutions, which, on motion duly seconded, were adopted:

"Whereas, Mr. Justice O. O. Provosty of the parish of Pointe Coupee has served as a Justice of the Supreme Court of this State during the past seven years with eminent satisfaction to the bench, the bar and the people; and

Whereas he is a candidate for re-election to the position which he now occupies and we recognize in him all the attributes of the model appellate judge: morality, sobriety, wisdom, patience, industry, learning and the possession of a clear, terse, logical incisive style,

Resolved, That we cordially endorse his candidacy and commend him to the kind consideration of the electorate of this Supreme Court District.

Resolved further, that the Secretary of this meeting be and he is hereby instructed to forward a copy of these resolutions to Mr. Justice Provosty and to furnish copies thereof to the Press of this parish and the City of New Orleans.

The total amount of cash collected was \$608.70. Besides this we got 5 bbls of corn meal, 500 pounds meat, 100 pounds ground coffee and a quantity of clothing. There were nine white families and fourteen negro families, making a total of eighty odd sufferers.

We met on the 6th inst. and made a division of what we had among the sufferers to the best of our ability, trying to give each in proportion to the loss sustained.

Missionary Notes.

BY THE SOCIETY.

Mrs. J. B. Cobb, Associate Secretary, by her careful inspection and wise counsel as she visited the mission stations occupied by the Woman's Board, has gained the lasting gratitude of the Board and greatly encouraged the missionary. She gave the time required to acquainting herself fully with conditions, and strengthened the bond between the home societies and the mission field. The wisdom of the Board is justified in sending one so eminently qualified as Mrs. Cobb. She loved the workers, sympathized with them. She understood their relation to the Board, and, like Joshua and Caleb of old, brought back a good account.

The Board was fortunate in selecting Miss Daisy Davies to visit the societies at home. Her enthusiasm, her interest in the cause of missions, her love for the young college girls and students opened the way to their hearts, and resulted in the consecration of many to God's service and not a few to the special work of foreign missions. Ten missionaries and two missionary watchmen are under appointment, and will leave for different fields of work during the summer. Those to Brazil usually leave earlier than those for China, June, July and August being winter time in the southern part of Brazil, but summer time hot and humid, in the parts of China occupied by the Woman's Board. Twenty missionaries have been asked

for only ten available! The problem of a world's evangelization can be solved only by individual activity. All the strategy of the Evil One is used to defeat missions, or at least, to rob the work of all true inspiration. Missionary activity is the only escape from dishonesty and robbery, both toward God and man. Stewardship implies an obligation. "He that gives not steals."

The Church has been accused of "playing at missions" and this great work has been too often looked upon as the business of women and children. The Laymen's movement is at last taking hold as it should; for, pre-eminently, missionary work calls for men, men as workers, men as supporters. At the great Laymen's meeting in Chattanooga, Mr. Bryce, Ambassador from Great Britain to the United States, said in his address on the occasion among other good things: "How much splendid work missions have accomplished, I need not tell you. As a traveler, I have had frequent opportunities of seeing the results in Africa, and in India and in the Turkish East. No mission, I have done more good than those who have come from your own country."

Miss Ella Leveritt has reached her appointment in Changchow, China and reports herself well and happy. Her furlough in the United States not only restored her health but enabled her to arouse much interest among our societies.

Miss Arena Carroll, of Sango, Korea, opened her Bible School with thirty-two women, and is closing the school next year with fifty-five. The Koreans are eager students of God's Word, and as soon as they experience a change of heart are at once anxious to lead others to God.

Miss Carroll would like her Bible women to be taken up as special, none of them being able to pay expenses. Miss Erwin, also in Sango, asks for help in closing her school. When we think of the small amount (forty dollars) it takes to support a scholarship it makes us sad to know that so few are doing this work. Why we in our home town could support several. Several persons could club together, and keep a girl in school. Let us "do with our might what our hands find to do."
