Young Folk of Opelousas Tendered Complimentary Trip to City of Crowley.

DAUGHTER OF HER MOTHER.
"Maamoo's" Daughter Making Time for Wearing Shoe Leather of Another.
A copper colored damsel walking around with the distinguished name of Victoria Buckingham was sent to the parish works for two months by Judge E. T. Lewis Tuesday, having pleaded guilty to a charge of petty larceny, i. e., stealing the footwear of another grizette of the same complexion. When it developed that Victoria of the House of Buckingham was the daughter of Louisa Picayune, alias "Maamoo," a notorious police character, her fall was not shocking. Vic says her Ma told her she was 17 years old.
Two other negroes pleaded guilty and were sentenced Tuesday.
One is Charley Anselm, who said he was guilty of swiping a suit case from a traveler at the O. Gee depot at Port Barre, containing a suit of clothes and a hat valued at \$21. He was given a year in the State penitentiary.
A moon-eyed, kildee-legged little coon, seventeen years old, was brought up on a charge of breaking into the store of Mr. John P. Savant at Whiteville, and stealing therefrom \$18 in cash. He admitted going into the store, "But I only tuck candy, judge," he told his Honor. He was given four months on the parish works.
GOMPERS IS FOR BRYAN.
Labor Federation's Head Will Support the Democratic Ticket Headed by Great Commoner.
Lincoln, Neb., July 13.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, will not only vote for Bryan, but will take the stump for him during the campaign. After a conference with Mr. Bryan today, Mr. Gompers made the following statement:
"I have always been a Republican, but I shall vote this fall for Mr. Bryan, and will go on the stump for the Democratic national ticket, and will use all honorable means within my power to secure his election. The Democratic platform expresses the principles for which the American Federation of Labor and its officers have worked and, of course, in supporting and fighting for the success of these principles we will support and fight for the candidates who are pledged to carry them into effect."
Scott Heywood Visits Opelousas.
Mr. Scott Heywood, the oil magnate, accompanied by Prof. Florian Santag, of Lafayette, were visitors to Opelousas Tuesday, stopping with Judge Gilbert L. Dupre.
It is given out that there is no significance in the visit of the oil king of Jennings to Opelousas. "Merely a social visit," said Judge Dupre, when questioned in the matter.

Dr. Clopton in the chair.
To the Hon. President and Members of the Police Jury of the parish of St. Landry:
Your undersigned property taxpayers of St. Landry parish, residents of School District No. One of the second police jury ward, whose limits and bounds by virtue of a resolution of the Board of School Directors of said Parish, passed April 4th, 1906, and defined as follows, to-wit: The territory to be included within the lines and bounds running as follows: To begin at a point on the half mile east of the railroad on the ward line between the 1st and 2d Police Jury Wards to run south parallel with the railroad to the parish line of Lafayette and St. Landry parishes, and then to run west along the ward line between the 1st and 2d Police Jury Wards until the parish of Acadia is reached, the parishes of Lafayette and Acadia to the south and western boundaries of the district herein created, respectfully petition your honorable body to order a special election throughout said school district for the purpose of submitting to the property taxpayers of said school district entitled to vote at such election the proposition of levying a special tax of three mills on the dollar for a period of ten years on all taxable property in said school district for the following purposes and objects, to-wit:
1st.—Said special tax levy to be for the purpose of and used only for the benefits of the public schools of this district and more especially for the purpose of paying the salaries of teachers, the prolonging of school sessions, the paying of salaries of teachers, and the operation, if deemed advisable, of school transfers or wagons, in pursuance to law in such cases made and provided, and in conformity to the petition of more than one-fifth of the property tax payers of said school district hereto annexed and made a part hereof; said tax to be levied and collected in pursuance to and in accordance with law, beginning with the year 1909.
2d.—Be it further ordained, etc., that said special election shall be held under the general election laws of this state at the place established by law in said district, and that the ballots to be used shall be printed in the form provided under said general election laws, and shall have printed thereon:
FOR a special tax of three (3) mills on the dollar per annum for the period of ten (10) years, for the purpose of constructing, repairing and equipping school buildings, the prolonging of school sessions, the paying of salaries of teachers, and the operation, if deemed advisable, of school transfers or wagons, in pursuance to law in such cases made and provided.
3d.—Be it further ordained, etc., that the Board of Supervisors of Election of the Parish of St. Landry be and they are hereby requested and directed to appoint three commissioners and a clerk to serve and hold said election at the place established by law in said district, to give due notice of said appointment, and of the time and

place of holding said election, and to make returns of said election to the President of the Police Jury, who announce and promulgate the result of said election according to law.
Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That the Board of Supervisors of Election of the Parish of St. Landry shall have 500 ballots printed in accordance with the provisions of the general election laws of this state and of this ordinance, to be sent to said school district by the Sheriff of this parish, with the ballot box and other election paraphernalia.
Section 5. Be it further ordained, etc., That each voter voting at said election shall endorse his ballot by signing his name thereon, and indicate the amount of his assessment of property situated in said school district.
Section 6. Be it further ordained, etc., That the commissioners of election shall receive the ballots of all property tax payer of said school district entitled to vote under the Constitution and laws of this state, and when the polls are closed, shall count said ballots and make returns of the votes cast at said election both in number and amount of assessed value of property of those who voted for said tax, and of those who voted against the same.
Section 7. Be it further ordained, etc., That this ordinance and annexed petition of the property tax payers of said school district be published in the St. Landry Clarion, the official journal of this parish, for the full period of thirty clear days previous to the date of holding said election, and that this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.
