### BARKSDALE BADLY HURT.

Popular O. Gee Conductor Meets With An Accident at the Crowley Depot.

The Clarion regrets to learn of the serious injury sustained by Mr. I. W. Barksdale, the popular conductor on the Opelousas, Gulf & Northeastern, at Crowley, last Saturday, while going to his train.

Mr. Barksdale is taken to his train every morning in a buggy by one of his sons, says the Signal, and Saturday morning his horse became frightened at an engine, as they were crossing the Frisco tracks, wheeling around very suddenly and almost upsetting the buggy. Mr. Barksdale was thrown out striking his head upon the rail.

His forehead, left side of his face and left leg is badly bruised and his left wrist is sprained. He was sent home immediately in Sheriff Fontenot's carriage and medical attention was summoned to attend his wounds. It will probably be several days before he will be able to resume his run on the passenger train.

Mr. Barksdale weighs about two hundred pounds and is fortunate that his injuries were not more serious in the fall he received.

The passenger train was run to Opelousas by Messenger Maxfield where Superintendent Harry Flanders took charge and made the rest of the run to Melville and return.

#### How to Fail With Poultry.

P. H. Jacobs, poultryman and editor, gives a few ways to insure failure in poultry keeping:

1. Endeavor to keep two fowls where room for one only can be obtained; that is, saving expenses by cheapening the cost of houses and space.
2. Buying fowls from other farms and thus bringing disease and lice into the flock.
3. Overfeeding, the fowls being supplied with the greatest abundance under the supposition, "the more feed the more eggs."
4. Cold drafts over the fowls at night, with a view of supplying fresh air, when the thermometer is low.
5. Wasting time with sick fowls, instead of destroying all birds that can not be quickly cured.
6. Disregarding the breeds by keeping anything that is a fowl.
7. Lack of exercise, the fowls being idle, discontented and consuming food because they have nothing to do.
8. Failure to provide sufficient warmth in winter, a season when eggs are highest.
9. Feeding three times a day, the result being indigestion and the introduction of disease in the flock.
10. Lice, both mites and the large lice that are found only on the bodies of the fowls and at all seasons of the year.

### WHEN SHREVEPORT IS DRY.

Thirst Will be Quenched While Sailing on the Blue Waters of the River.

Quoth the Monroe News:

A party from Shreveport yesterday told of a unique way in which the saloon men, at least some of them, will take advantage of the prohibition laws, which go into effect at Shreveport next January.

"The party stated that he had heard some of the whiskey handlers say that they were going to fit up saloons on pleasure boats. They will get a crowd of passengers and take a trip on the river and while en route will dispense beverages to the thirsty members of the crowd. It was also stated that they would have suitable bottles for their customers to take a supply home with them.

"It was also stated that the saloons would be fitted up on barges so that they could be attached to the boats. "The party, who was telling the above, was confident that the scheme could be worked successfully and it was his opinion that several such boats would be fitted up. He also stated that it was his opinion that there was no law prohibiting the sale of whiskey on the river after the parties secure a license from the United States Government."

### CAN NOW REGULATE STABLES.

Legislature at Recent Session Passes Law that Touches Once Mooted Question Here.

The Louisiana Legislature at its session just adjourned passed a bill amending section three of Act 136 of 1898, an act "for the creation and government of municipal corporations throughout the State," etc.

The amendatory act is known as Act 230, and was introduced by Senator Peterman, of Avoyelles, at the instance of Judge E. T. Lewis, of Opelousas, who prepared the bill. It will be remembered that Judge Lewis engaged in litigation with Sandall & Powell when the latter attempted to erect a stable opposite his residence.

The new law, (which becomes operative Friday, August 7, having been promulgated on July 17), gives municipal corporations power "To locate within its corporate limits livery and sales stables, and prescribe and enforce such regulations as they may see fit for the construction and conduct of the same; provided, that no sale or livery stable, for either horses or cattle, shall be located within three hundred feet of a house of worship, nor in a residential district, without the consent of a majority of the residents living within three hundred yards of any proposed location of such stable."

#### How to Make Cold Meat Loaf

"Avoid warm hashes in summer, and have in their place a meat loaf that can be served cold," writes Christine Terhune Herrick in Woman's Home Companion for August. "Chop your remnants of steak or

roast fine, mix with them one third as much cold boiled ham or tongue, season well, and add a couple of raw eggs beaten light. If rather dry, moisten with gravy or stock, turn into a greased mold with plain sides, cover, set in a baking pan with hot water about it, and bake for an hour. This loaf may also be made with raw beef, but then it must cook for two hours. Let it get very cold before turning out, and slice. Veal loaf may be prepared by this recipe, and even cold roast lamb may be treated in same manner. The main point to be borne in mind is the seasoning. Be careful that this is well done and you will have a popular dish."

### HANGING FOLLOWS FIRE.

Negro Suspects Put to Death, and Those Who Harbored Them Lashed and Made to Leave.

Jonesville, Catahoula parish, July 18.—Two negroes were put to death here yesterday, following the burning of the mill barn of J. W. Swayze, near here, and many who had harbored the negro suspects were scourged until blood flowed, after which they were ordered to leave with threats of death if they returned.

It was not quite daylight when the two negroes were taken forcibly from their homes and hanged to a stout oak. The two blacks, it is said, had some trouble at the gin of Mr. Swayze, and it is said they ventured remarks of a threatening nature, and intimated that they would be avenged for alleged wrongs done them. After the fire, the negroes kept themselves concealed and a search for them proved fruitless.

A party of citizens learned that they had returned to their homes early yesterday morning, and making their way quietly to the small huts, found them abed. Binding them the crowd dragged the blacks from their homes, and without ceremony, placed a rope about their necks and hanged them to the first tree.

#### The Cane Crop.

The Sugar Planter's Journal has the following summary of the condition of the sugar crop through the Louisiana cane district:

"Though the past fortnight's work in the cane fields has been interrupted by general showers, the final cultivation of the crop has now been practically completed in the various parishes and the fields left in a state of unusual freedom from grass, due to the thorough cultivation given. With admirable growing weather from now on, there is reason to hope that much of the shortage in size of the cane complained of in some sections will be made up during the summer, but it seems definitely assured we will not see the harvesting of any record crop coming fall; yet we may expect a normally good sugar out turn, should the summer bring the usual quota of moisture, for the stands of cane average higher than ordinarily on many estates, and this may offset much of the cane's deficiency in growth. There is no getting around the fact that, the size of the cane crop, for the middle of July, is smaller than usual."

### AMENDMENTS.

People of Louisiana Will Vote on Nine Amendments at the November Election.

Nine Constitutional Amendments will be voted on at the election next November, as follows:

1. Making the salary of State Superintendent of Education \$5,000.
2. Exempting mortgages and loans of life insurance companies to their policy holders from taxation.
3. Authorizing the Sewerage and Water Board of New Orleans to pay not to exceed 6 per cent commission on first \$4,000,000 of its \$8,000,000 bond issue.
4. Authorizing the Dock Board of New Orleans to issue \$3,500,000.
5. Providing for care of neglected children and establishing juvenile court in New Orleans.
6. Making the salary of State Treasurer \$4,000 and State Auditor \$5,000.
7. Relative to Confederate veterans, making maximum appropriations of beneficiaries.
8. Amending Article 281, with the view of permitting Shreveport to refund her bonds and issue additional bonds for public improvements.
9. Amending Article 134, permitting allotment of cases in Civil Court, Orleans, to be made under rules of judges.




