## MICROBES IN HOLY WATER.

Results of Recent Scientific Studies by an Italian Monk.

Rome, July 19.—Augusta Gemelli, an Italian monk, has recently scientifically studied the sanitary dangers lurking in holy water. Each cubic centimetre of holy water in the basins in the church of Santa Croce, Turin, taken from the surface, contained 150,000 microbes; while a cubic centimetre taken from the bottom contained 6,000,000 microbes. He injected this water into animals and found that it always killed them, the causes of death being tuberculosis or diphtheria.

The monk recommends a new form of holy water receptacles, constructed that persons, instead of dipping their fingers into it, can obtain three drops of water by pressing a button.

**Machine for Catching Weevil and Gathering Squares.**

Morrow, La., July 19.—A local inventor, Elisha Attaway, last week tried out before a large and interested crowd a device for catching the cotton boll weevil and gathering the punctured squares found on all cotton infested by the weevil. The test took place in the field of a planter of this place, and was conducted in cotton known to be infested with the pest. The machine, which exists at present only in the form of a rather rough model, was quickly adjusted and set up in cotton three feet high, where two rows could be covered at once by the machine. Two rounds were then made, covering four rows of cotton about 130 yards long. Investigation of the contents of the trap showed that about 100 grown weevils and several hundred punctured squares had been gathered in. Examination revealed the presence of the larvae of the insect in a large percentage of the captured forms. The machine is simple, light and strong. It takes two rows of cotton of almost any size at once, and can be made to cover at least twenty acres per day. Mr. Attaway is hopeful and will use his machine upon his own farm this year, where he hopes to thoroughly demonstrate its utility.

## Acetyline Plant Explodes.

Jennings, July 18.—While recharging a fifty-light acetyline gas plant here this afternoon, B. J. Perry, an employee of the A. F. Derouen Hardware Company, sustained very painful injuries by the explosion of the plant. The plant had been idle for several months and young Perry was putting it in shape for use. His arms and hands and neck and face were badly burned. The plant was torn to pieces and the building was set afire, but the flames were promptly extinguished.

## No Cure For Charbon.

Dr. Thomas Mitchell of Honma, expert on the disease of charbon, who has been studying conditions in the badly infected districts, announces that there is no cure for the disease, as it is internal, and the seat of the disease cannot be reached.
