INTERESTING NOTES FROM THE STATE CAPITOL.

Baton Rouge, Sept. 15.—At its opening Wednesday, Louisiana State University showed a larger attendance than ever before in its history, and the outlook was for a greater number of students during the entire session than ever before. With a number of additions to the faculty, with a new dean of the Law School, and a wider scope to the Agricultural College, and to the Teachers' College, a more attractive curriculum has been offered than has been possible before.

During the first of this week the registrar's office has been crowded.

On Wednesday simple opening exercises were held in Garig Hall. The rest of the week will be devoted to assignments to classes, arrangement of hours, etc. and next Monday active class work will begin.

One of the striking features of the year is the completion of the beautiful Alumni Hall, just inside the entrance to the school, which will be occupied as the administrative building by October tenth.

Col. T. D. Boyd, president of the school, declares that the session of 1909-1910, opens with prospects that are "brilliant"

Public schools in Baton Rouge have been in operation a week now, with an enrollment several hundred more than last season, and with a remarkable number of children whose parents are new comers to Baton Rouge. With crowded class rooms, the school board is planning to urge the immediate construction of a new school building on the square obtained for that purpose from the State immediately in the rear of the old penitentiary property.

That Baton Rouge is actively interested in the development of waterway intercourse with the Valley of the Teche has been demonstrated by the enthusiastic co-operation extended by the wholesale element here to the project of Wilds and French, formerly of Natchez, Miss., to operate the steamboat Concordia in the Bayou Plaquemine-Morgan City-Teche Valley trade. Capt. Wilds will make the trip twice a week, going as high up as Breau Bridge. He has been pledged the active assistance of every freight shipper in Baton Rouge, who have all agreed to work the Teche Valley trade at once. This will mean the first competition the Southern Pacific has had in that region in many years.

A quantity of old flintlocks were dug up last week, by workmen engaged in laying sewer pipe, on the grounds of the State University, near where the old arsenal stood during the time of the Mexican war. The flintlocks had apparently never been on muskets, but were extra parts stored, and thrown away after the Mexican war, when percussion caps were invented and put on the army fire arms.

Not long since, while laying the foundations of a house near the old

garrison grounds, in a section where the old Spanish quarter stood, a number of Spanish coins were found.

Governor Sanders has issued a letter to all the Governors of the cotton states, enclosing to them a letter recently given by him to the Louisiana press, urging cotton planters to hold their cotton and sell it sparingly, declaring that such a procedure would be almost certain to bring them better average returns. The Governor suggests to his colleagues that similar letters from them would have an excellent moral effect and would prevent the cotton being dumped on the market now.

That Governor Sanders is going to take up on a broad scale the conservation problem, working it in line with his good roads programme, is indicated by the letter addressed by him last week to the Governors of all the Southern States, and to all conservation commissions of the Southern States, inviting them to a "conservation conference" to be held in New Orleans at the time of the great waterways convention late in October. Governor Sanders has paid special attention to the problem of the cut-over pine lands, and the Louisiana Commission has, at his suggestion, gathered a mass of data on this topic which it is desired to compare with the experience of other Southern States along the same lines.

In its plan for the "City Beautiful" as well as the "city prosperous" Baton Rouge has found that she may already possess clear title to a hundred acres of excellent and available park site land just adjoining the city limits to the South. This land was bought and donated conditionally to the Louisiana State University twenty odd years ago, and District Attorney Hubert N. Wax has issued a letter declaring that L. S. U. has never used this land in accordance with the conditions and that hence the city may now enter into possession without legal process.

With the return of President Farnbacher of the Board of Trade, immediate steps will be taken to have the Board begin work on the programme already mapped out for the entertainment of President Taft and his party when they come to Baton Rouge October 29. President Taft has lengthened his stay in Baton Rouge to two hours, and the city will plan a programme covering the afternoon and evening which will furnish entertainment to the thousands who are expected here from all parts of Central Louisiana and Southern Mississippi, to hear the Chief Executive, who will speak from the Federal building, facing North Boulevard, at 7:45 in the evening.

Protracted Drought.

Abbeville, Sept. 14.—The Police Jury this afternoon considered the petitions of the friends of the licensed sale of liquor asking that the question be resubmitted to the voters at a special election to be held this fall. After a thorough presentation of the matter by the liquor people and the prohibitionists the jury by a unanimous vote decided to postpone action until after Jan. 1. It is believed that this means the parish will remain dry another year.
