THE STATE'S INDEBTEDNESS.

Farmerville Gazette: We all know that the State of Louisiana has a bonded indebtedness but we venture to say that only a small portion of the people of Louisiana know just how much that debt is and just how much interest we are paying each year to the bondholders. The debt is about \$11,400,000 and, as the bonds are drawing four per cent interest, it means an annual drain upon the State treasury of \$450,000. Just think if what could be accomplished in the way of improvement throughout the State if this half million dollars were saved each year and wisely spent. Think of the schools that could be built, the colleges, agricultural, mechanical and literary, that could be endowed and the numerous other public benefits that it could be used for. Four hundred and forty thousand dollars, annually, could be made to do a great deal for the public good and we trust that some plan will be adopted, at the present session, to successfully retire the debt and save this enormous amount of interest that we are annually throwing away.
