ROOSEVELT THE FIRST BACK ON HIS NATIVE HEATH.

After Shooting African Beasts and Hot-Airing Potentates, He Comes Home to Roost.

New York, June 18.—Beneath the brightest of skies, the steamer Kaiserin Victoria, bearing former President Roosevelt, glided into New York harbor this morning.

Flanked by Mrs. Roosevelt, Mrs. Nicholas Longworth, and his son, Kermit, Mr. Roosevelt stood on the flying bridge of the liner, high above all the decks of the ship, and with the characteristic smile overspreading his countenance and a shiny silk hat in his hand he waved acknowledgment to the welcome which came from every side.

The Kaiserin Victoria entered New York harbor shortly after 8 o'clock, receiving a salute of twenty-one guns from the battleship South Carolina. After Mr. Roosevelt had received the first formal greetings he boarded the cutter Manhattan and was brought to the cutter Androscoogin, which appeared well up in the water parade given in honor of the returning ex-president.

Swamp Lands Must Be Reclaimed.

The present Congress at Washington will adjourn presently, and its work will be subjected to a general review, says the St. Louis Times of June 14th.

And against this record of failure to attend to the public business broadly and with a realization of what first-class citizenship means, there is the fact that opportunities for establishing a record have been crying aloud for attention.

The foremost fact in American affairs for the past year is that the price of living has advanced to a point unprecedented, barring the abnormal inflation of values during the Civil War.

If this be true—as it doubtless is part—how can Congress explain these two facts: Americans, largely of the agrarian classes, are going to Canada at the rate of 90,000 a year.

We can find an answer to the first question. The farmers are going to Canada because the Canadian Government has wisely discovered that it is a better policy to foster the enterprises of the millions of farmers than to promote the interests of a comparatively few corporations.

American business demands the retirement of the politician. It demands that the swamp lands be reclaimed. People in all lines of enter-

prise make the demand. The railroads need to handle the trainloads of crops which should be growing annually in the submerged lands in Arkansas, Louisiana, Texas, Mississippi and other States. The farmers plainly need the land; the people need the products of the farm at reasonable prices, and not those which are shipped at prohibitive prices, as is to some extent now the case, from other countries.

What does the voter mean to do as a rebuke to a body of men who have permitted the most magnificent opportunity of the century to slip through their fingers?

The Times believes that the United States will claim the gift of 25,000,000 acres of land, added to its farming area. It believes that the exodus of 90,000 people annually from this country will be checked. And when every voter embraces this belief, the thing will speedily come to pass.

Now They Didn't Want Him to Vote.

Lake Charles, La., June 16.—Sheriff D. J. Reid today began mandamus proceedings to compel Registrar of Voters P. D. Leblen to place his name on the registered voters' list. The sheriff applied for registration Tuesday and found that the books closed the previous evening, thirty days before the special city election.

HE CAN VOTE.

Lake Charles, La., June 20.—A decision of great deal of interest was rendered this afternoon when Judge Overton decided that Sheriff Reid had a right to vote without registering so long as he made affidavit that he was qualified, notwithstanding the fact that he failed to register before the registration books were closed last week.
