MERCHANTS JOIN FARMERS IN THE FIGHT AGAINST WEEVIL

Jackson, Miss., July 25.—The merchants of Hinds county are actively co-operating with the United States Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Plant Industry, in the fight of the boll weevil. Many of them are sending out circulars to the farmers giving advice and instruction relative to methods of fighting the pest. Here is the caption of a circular just issued by the Gaddis-McLaurin Company, of Bolton, Clinton and Raymond, one of the largest firms in the county:

"Don't Be Run Out of the County by a Bug! Fight Him! Put the Squares in the Fire and Burn Him Up! Give Him Hell!"

Continuing its advice to the farmers relative to methods that should now be employed, the circular says: "So many of us lay by our crops about this time every year. Knowing this leads us to say that we have come a long way on this crop, and those of us who have picked up the squares now see the good results of our work, namely, time we go over. But now is the critical time. By laying by now and leaving your crop you surely turn it over to Mr. Boll Weevil, for when he finishes puncturing squares he will start on the bolls. Keep running your cultivators and side harrows lightly and don't let the sun get too hot for you to keep picking up those punctured squares."

Similar advice is given by Mr. J. W. Ratcliff & Son, who have issued the following: "Our prospects, barring the weevil, were never better, and we are told by our government agents that the weevil has destroyed only about twenty per cent of the squares to date, and if we will continue picking them and cultivating we will be sure of a fairly good crop."

"We know this to be a very critical time in the fight, therefore, we urge you to keep everything going for the next few weeks. The recent wet spell has given the weevil a good start, but with the prospects of dry weather we insist upon your making an extra effort to head him off by fighting to the end. Do not stop cultivation too soon."

THE "STOCK FOOD" FRAUD

"Progressive Farmer and Farm Gazette" refuses to advertise Condimental Stock Food. That The Progressive Farmer and Gazette is right in refusing to advertise the condimental stock foods that are enabling men to make large fortunes out of mill oil, is well shown by the results of feeding experiments at the Iowa State College Experiment Station. Bulletin 113 gives the following conclusion from a 55-day test:

- (1) Stock foods did not have any beneficial effect on the digestion. (2) Stock foods did not have any appreciable effect in getting greater gains from a corn ration than can be obtained from feeding corn alone. (3) It required more feed to produce a pound of gain when stock foods were used than when corn was fed alone. (4) A bushel of corn produced as much or more pork when corn was fed alone than it did when stock food was added to it. (5) The pork produced by corn alone returned a greater net value per bushel of corn fed than was returned when a stock food was added to the corn.

These trials included all the stock foods so freely advertised in most agricultural papers.—Progressive Farmer and Farm Gazette.

Pine Prairie.

Pine Prairie, July 25.—We have had so much rain that it has practically tied up all work in the timber business. Corn crop is not as good as it should be on account of too much rain. Cotton is very good, though rather late. Cane is good. A large crop of sweet potatoes has been planted.

The Miles Mineral Co. lost well No. 5 at a depth of 2200 feet, but soon will start well No. 6. It seems that they are determined to find oil and it is hoped that they will succeed. Mr. B. J. Anderson of this place

"Dear Superintendent: When employing faculties of the Approved High Schools, the following resolution of the State Board of Education, adopted January 7th, 1910, must be observed: 'Resolved, That beginning with the Session 1910-11 no teacher holding lower than a first grade certificate shall be employed in the State Approved High Schools. This regulation shall apply to grade teachers as well as to teachers in high school departments.' 'Stated in a word, second and third grade teachers cannot be employed in Approved High Schools, and the regulation applies to the elementary grades as well as to the high school departments. In your selection of teachers for your high schools please see that this requirement is met."

Crop Conditions In Rapides.

From Alexandria Town-Talk: Farmers from different portions of Rapides Parish coming into Alexandria for the week-end trading, bring very promising reports of crops in general, with the possible exception of cotton. They are almost unanimous in stating that cotton's greatest need at the present time, is a week or ten days more of dry, hot weather, under which conditions they estimate that a crop of a half bale to the acre will be made. The showers of the past month have kept the fields in such soft condition that the clearing out of grass and weeds was an impossibility, and these are the farmer's greatest trouble at the present time.

The boll weevil is not reported as being especially damaging so far, although in some places they are being noticed in increasing numbers. Corn throughout the parish is flourishing, and the farmers are well-satisfied with the prospects for a heavy yield. Melons and fruit are coming into the city plentifully, and while bringing good prices for the farmer, are not selling so high as to be beyond the reach of a poor man. Garden truck is also coming in plentiful supply, and selling at reasonable prices.

Your committee, consisting of Messrs. Loeb, Larcade and St. Cyr appointed to draft ordinance relative to W. W. and E. L. Supt., and the governing of same, beg leave to submit this following ordinance:

AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance governing the Electrician and Waterworks Plant, establishing rules for the operation and management of the Electric Light and Waterworks Plant of the City of Opelousas, La.

Section 1. There shall be a manager of the Electric Light and Water Works Plant to be elected by the Board of Aldermen, who shall serve for two years from date of election and who shall be a graduate of an electrical institution, and who shall submit proper recommendations of his efficiency, he shall be removed at any time by the Board of Aldermen for cause.

Section 2. The manager shall take charge of the plant, shall attend to the same, do necessary repairs, wiring and tapping for the City, whether for public or private use, and who shall personally read all water and gas meters in use, except in case of disability when he shall at once appoint a substitute and shall inspect all wiring done by any contractor.

Section 3. The manager shall employ such employees as may be necessary to operate the plant, by and with the consent of the Board of Aldermen and he shall be required to flush out each water hydrant once every thirty days, and also to keep the screw taps in good working order and well greased or oiled on hydrants.

Section 4. All supplies necessary to the successful operation of the plant to be ordered by the Board of Aldermen of the City, and report of said purchases to be made to the Board of Aldermen at its first regular meeting following the said purchases.

Section 5. The manager shall each month make a full report to the Board of Aldermen in writing, giving number of lights, private and public, furnished during the month, of all water furnished, supplies consumed and work done, and a full report of the condition of the plant, as are usually made by first class plants and shall furnish a monthly report of all dead meters and cause of failure.

Section 6. The manager shall receive for his faithful services a salary to be determined upon by the Board of Aldermen.

Section 7. No manager shall be elected until the Mayor shall have advertised asking for propositions from all persons desiring to apply for said position, and in all cases the Council must elect the best proposition providing this provision does not affect the term of office of the present incumbent.

Section 8. Be it further ordained that all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance, be and the same are hereby repealed.

Ordinance adopted at its third reading.

An ordinance prescribing the condition under which hogs and swine may be kept within the corporate limits. Motion to adopt the above motion after its third reading, duly seconded and carried.

AN ORDINANCE.

Prescribing the condition under which hogs and swine may be kept within the corporate limits of the City of Opelousas, and prescribing penalties for violating the provisions of said ordinance.

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Opelousas, La. That it shall be unlawful for any one to keep on their premises or property more than one head of swine for every 5000 sq. ft. of ground and the swine shall have a ring put in their nose or operated in such a manner as to prevent them from rooting.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, That it shall be unlawful for anyone to keep swine (hogs) in a pen from April 1st to Nov. 1st of each year.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, That any one violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than three (\$3.00) nor more than ten (\$10.00) dollars or imprisonment for not less than three nor more than ten days, or both, at the discretion of the Court.

Sec. 4. Be it further ordained, by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, That for good and sufficient cause this ordinance shall take effect from date of its first publication.

Sec. 5. Be it further ordained, That the Board of Health shall cause further notice of this ordinance by posters to be distributed through the city.

Sec. 6. Be it further ordained, That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with any of the provisions of this ordinance, be and the same are hereby repealed.

ious, La., and providing penalties for noncompliance with the provisions of said ordinance.

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Opelousas, La. That the occupants of any premises or properties within the corporate limits of the City of Opelousas, La. shall clean up and place their premises and properties in a sanitary condition in the following manner, to-wit: All trash shall be raked up and burned, and such as cannot be burned must be buried and removed, and provided, burned or hauled away; all stables, hog-pens, chicken-coops, dog-kennels, pens of different pets, etc. shall be kept clean and the refuse hauled away and disposed of. Under all buildings shall be kept clean all holes or depressions where water will stand must be filled up or drained. All sanitary and other closets and urinals shall be cleaned sufficiently often to prevent them from producing a nuisance, and provided, when any sanitary or other closet or urinal is so constructed that the use of it produces a nuisance, the same shall be repaired and removed in a manner that the use thereof will not produce a nuisance. All wood, lumber, bricks, etc. shall be piled up in an orderly way, and any other unsightly condition that may exist shall be corrected when the health officer or his representative shall order its abatement.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, That where the premises or property are unoccupied, it is hereby made the duty of the owner of the property to clean up and place the premises or property in a sanitary condition as provided in Section 1 of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, That any one violating or failing to comply with the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$10.00, or to imprisonment for not less than 15 days, or both, at the discretion of the Court.

Sec. 4. Be it further ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, That any one violating or failing to comply with the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$10.00, or to imprisonment for not less than 15 days, or both, at the discretion of the Court.

Sec. 5. Be it further ordained, That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with any of the provisions of this ordinance, be and the same are hereby repealed.
