Call for Primaries.

Alexandria, La., July 5, 1910. The Democratic Executive Committee of the Seventh Congressional District of Louisiana met this day pursuant to the call of the Chairman, the following members being present in person or by proxy: At Large E. B. Dubuisson, proxy to B. T. Lewis.

Resolved, That a White Democratic Primary Election be held throughout the Seventh Congressional District of the State of Louisiana, on Tuesday, the 6th day of September, A. D. 1910, between legal hours, for the purpose of nominating the candidates for the Democratic party for Representative in the 52nd Congress of the United States for said district, and member of the Board of Equalization under Act 182 of 1908, at the election to be held on Nov. 8th, 1910; said primary to be held under the provisions, rules and regulations of Act No. 40 of the general Assembly of the State of Louisiana, for the year 1906, as amended, known as the Primary Election Law.

Resolved, That all candidates for Congress shall file their qualifications of candidacy with the Secretary of State, in the form required by Section 11 of Act 19 of Act of 1906, on or before the 26th day of July, 1910, and that candidates for office of Member of the State Board of Equalization file the notification of candidacy as required by law.

Resolved, That at the same time and place the names of the elected from each Parish of the Seventh Congressional District of Louisiana, two (2) qualified electors therein, who shall constitute the Congressional Democratic Executive Committee for the respective Parishes of the District shall, within twenty (20) days from the issuance of this call, file with the Secretary of State their written notification of intention to become a candidate for such office at said primary. The members of the newly elected Congressional Committee shall meet at the Court House in the City of Alexandria, Louisiana, on the first Monday of October, 1910, at 12 o'clock, noon, to organize.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this committee be and he is hereby authorized and instructed to call the attention of the Chairman of the respective Parish Democratic Committees, of the Registrars of Voters, and of the Sheriffs of each of the respective Parishes of the Seventh Congressional District of Louisiana, to their duties under the provisions of section 21 and 22 of said Act No. 40 of 1906, as amended.

Be it further Resolved, That the Secretary be, and he is hereby authorized and required to furnish the Official Journals of each Parish in the Congressional District with a copy of this call and the foregoing Resolutions for publication as required by law, and he is further authorized to pay the cost thereof out of the funds assessed against the candidates.

A. Sandoz and heirs of Leonce Sandoz, concerning said street. For the further purpose of dealing with the claim of H. C. Huston against the city for sidewalks, constructed on Court and Market street, and for the further purpose of considering the matter of ordering the purchase of books for the city clerk's office, to install the system to be furnished by the American Audit Co. To the Hon. Mayor and Members of the Board of Aldermen. Opelousas, La., July 27th, 1910. We the undersigned committee of the whole, after thoroughly investigating the matter of the continuation of the north end of Walnut street, going through the property of L. A. Sandoz and heirs of Leonce Sandoz, beg leave to report the following: The city is not in a financial condition to buy and pay for any street at present. The council has refused to do so for others who have applied to them for the same reason. The city attorney has advised the council that they could not issue any certificate of indebtedness, or make notes for the purchase of land for streets.

Motion by St. Cyr that the report of the above committee be received and committee discharged. Motion seconded and carried.

Motion by Mr. Danel—Considering the report of the committee and the fact made to appear to the council that the town has actually taken possession of the streets across the property of Messrs. L. and L. A. Sandoz, and has actually made the same for several years, be it resolved that the Council hereby acknowledges the indebtedness of the city of Opelousas to the said claimants for the value of said property so taken, and promises to pay the said amount out of any available funds as soon as the city is able to do so.

Motion lost for want of a second.

Motion by Mr. Loeb—That any business concerning the above motion be deferred for future consideration. Danel voting, votes no. Dietlein, Larcade, Loeb and St. Cyr vote yes. Motion carried. Motion by Mr. Danel—That the following resolution be adopted to-wit: RESOLUTION. Whereas, this Council at a special meeting held on the 26th instant, directed the Mayor to pay the certificates of indebtedness now due and held by R. C. Huston or his assigns, and which certificate is in the hands of Gilbert L. Dupre, Esq., for collection, and Whereas, since the said meeting it has been brought to the attention of this Body that a former Council on the 23rd day of December, 1909, passed a resolution declaring in effect that the said R. C. Huston, contractor, had defaulted in his said contract, in that he had not satisfied the claims of his sub-contractors and his material men, especially the claim of Mr. J. E. Allen, and further declared in said resolution that the claim of the said J. E. Allen should be paid and satisfied out of the contract price and said certificates of indebtedness should not be liquidated until the claim of said Allen be paid, and Whereas, the said resolution was not brought to the attention of this Board at its meeting on the 26th, instant, and Whereas, the aids J. E. Allen at this meeting has tendered to this Body an indemnity bond against any cost or charge that it might be subject to in case of a litigation with the said R. C. Huston or his assigns. Now, therefore, be it resolved that the said action of this Council taken as aforesaid on the 26th day of July, be and the same is hereby rescinded, annulled and set aside, and the Mayor directed not to pay any of the outstanding certificates of indebtedness until the claim of the said Allen is fully paid and satisfied, or a judgment of a competent court orders such payment.

On motion duly seconded the above resolution was adopted.

Know all men of these present, that J. E. Allen, as principal, and Dr. Jno. A. Haas, as surety, are bound and firmly held unto the City of Opelousas, La., in the full sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250).

Now, the condition of this bond is such that if the said J. E. Allen shall pay and satisfy the costs, interest and all other charges, saving and excepting the sum now due as per certificate of indebtedness, which the city might be held liable for in the impending suit between one R. C. Huston, contractor, or his transferees, or assigns, and the said city of Opelousas, then in that event this bond shall be null and void, otherwise the same shall be of full force and effect.

Your committee, consisting of Messrs. Loeb, Larcade and St. Cyr appointed to draft ordinance relative to W. W. and E. L. Supt., and the governing of same, beg leave to submit the following ordinance: Moved by ——— and duly seconded the following ordinance be adopted: AN ORDINANCE. An ordinance governing the Electrician and Manager of Electric Lights and Waterworks Plant, establishing rules for the operation and management of the Electric Light and Waterworks Plant of the City of Opelousas, La. Section 1. There shall be a manager of the Electric Light and Water Works Plant to be elected by the Board of Aldermen, who shall serve for two years from date of election and who shall be a graduate of an electrical institution, or who shall have not less than five years practical experience in that line, and who shall submit proper recommendations of his efficiency, he shall be removed at any time by the Board of Aldermen for cause. Section 2. The manager shall take charge of the plant, shall attend to the same, run it, do necessary repairing, wiring and tapping for the City, whether for public or private use, and who shall personally read all water and light meters in the city, except in case of disability when he shall at once appoint a substitute and shall inspect all wiring done in the city and tapping. Section 3. The manager shall employ such employees as may be necessary to operate the plant, by and with the consent of the Board of Aldermen and he shall be required to file on each water hydrant once every thirty days, and also to keep the screw taps in good working order and well greased or oiled on hydrants. Section 4. All supplies necessary to the successful operation of the plant to be ordered by the purchasing committee of the City and paid for by the City, to be made to the Board of Aldermen at its first regular meeting following the said purchases. Section 5. The manager shall each month make a full report to the Board of Aldermen in writing, giving number of lights, private and public, furnished, supplies consumed and work done, and all other necessary reports, as are usually made by class plants, and shall furnish a monthly report of all dead meters and cause of same. Section 6. The manager shall receive for his faithful services a salary to be determined upon by the Board of Aldermen. Section 7. No manager shall be elected until the Mayor shall have advertised asking for propositions from all parties desiring to apply for said position, and in all cases the Council shall elect the most competent man, submitting the best proposition providing this provision does not effect the term of office of the present incumbent. Section 8. Be it further ordained that for good and sufficient reasons this ordinance take effect from and after its passage and all ordinances or parts of ordinances contrary to or in conflict with this ordinance, be and the same are hereby repealed. Ordinance adopted at its third reading.
