FATHER MARING VISITS N. O.

And Tells the Piacyns of the Splendid College of Which He is President

"Rev. H. S. Maring, S. J., who is President of St. Charles College, at Grand Coteau, La., and who for six years was president of the Jesuits' College, in Baronne Street, arrived in New Orleans last night, and will be in the city for several days. He has been president of St. Charles College going on four years, and he speaks entertainingly of the progress of the college and its prospects for the future, says the New Orleans Piacyn.

"St. Charles College, being in St. Landry Parish, is in one of the strongest Catholic sections in Louisiana. It is a very old school, and some of the most prominent men in Louisiana either graduated there or obtained part of their educational training there. Governor J. Y. Sanders was a student there for two years.

"In 1901 and again in 1907 the college suffered fires. Father Maring was transferred there in 1907, and under his leadership the erection of the new college building has been practically completed. The new building is built of brick and concrete, and is 383 feet long and 110 feet wide in the wings. Its average width is fifty feet. The building is full three stories high, and the central portion is four stories. A water tower with a capacity of 20,000 gallons of water, is the source of fire protection.

"From Aug. 11 to 15 a layman's retreat was conducted at the college, and it was most successful. About thirty-five business men from various parts of Louisiana, including New Orleans, attended and received religious instruction. This was the first retreat of the kind conducted at the college, and Father Maring says they will be a yearly feature hereafter.

"The college will open this year on Sept. 7, and Father Maring is in New Orleans for the purpose of seeing about the boys who will be sent there this year. Father Maring will be in New Orleans until Sept. 7. He will be at the Jesuit College, in Baronne Street, and when he leaves the city he will be in charge of the boys entrusted to his care."
