Sanders Can Do More For Louisiana.

Some misinformed people have endeavored to prove that because Governor Sanders is making his canvass for the Senate as a Democrat and proposes to co-operate with the Democratic Party if elected, he is not favorable to the protection of sugar and rice, two of the state's leading products. Such a contention is utterly absurd. The greatest safety of sugar is based on the fact that the tariff which fosters it is a revenue duty, furnishing the government with the largest, easiest collected and most equitably distributed income that the tariff affords. Tariff for revenue is a fundamental Democratic doctrine, and is in less danger of attack at the hands of Democrats than from the "free breakfast table" coterie of the Republicans. 
