### The Appetizing Beefsteak.

In an article on "The Appetizing Beefsteak" in the May Woman's Home Companion, Fannie Merritt Farmer, the well-known cooking authority, presents a number of recipes, and gives the following general advice about steaks:

"The underlying principle which governs good broiling is this: One side of the meat must be quickly seared, the meat must be quickly turned, and the other side quickly seared. This prevents the escape of any of the juices. Turn almost constantly for the first minute of the cooking, then the meat must be cooked on one side, turned, and cooked on the other, to suit individual taste.

"The best cuts of meat for broiling are porterhouse, sirloin, cross-cut of rump-steak, and second and third cuts from top of round. Porterhouse and sirloin cuts, although commanding about the same price per pound as the cross-cut of the rump, prove most expensive on account of the greater loss in bone and fat. Round steak is very juicy, but, having coarser fibre is never as tender. Neither is the flank end of a porterhouse very tender. For this reason, it is a good plan to cut it off before cooking the steak, and use it for meat cakes (Hamburg steak), or a small stew, or perhaps a small beefsteak pie. Cut out the tenderloin and reserve it to be cooked for one meal; cut off the flank and save it to be prepared for another, then broil the sirloin for dinner. The bone may be used to give added richness to the stock, if the flank end is utilized for a stew."

### CHARTER OF THE LAWTELL GIN CO., LTD.

State of Louisiana,  
Parish of St. Landry.  
Be it known, that on this twenty-seventh (27th) day of the month of March, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and twelve (1912) before me, Stanislas Joseph Gosselein, a Notary Public, duly commissioned, qualified and sworn in and for the Parish and State first above written, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named personally came and appeared the persons whose names are hereunto subscribed and who severally declared that availing themselves of the provisions of Act No. 36 of the session of the Legislature of the State of Louisiana of 1888, approved June 29th, 1888, as well as the laws and decrees of the State relating to the formation and organization of corporations, they have formed and organized, and by these presents do form themselves into a corporation, the name of which shall hereafter become associated with them into a corporation and body politic in law for the object and purposes and under the stipulations following, to-wit:

Article I. The name and style of this corporation is hereby declared to be the Lawtell Gin Company, Limited, and it shall be so styled, succession, and existence for a period of ninety years from the date hereof. It shall have the power to contract, sue and be sued, to make a corporate seal, and the same to break or alter at pleasure; to hold, purchase, lease, rent, sell, mortgage, pledge, and hypothecate property real, personal and mixed; to name, elect and appoint managers, salesmen and agents; to make and establish by-laws, rules and regulations for the management of its business and affairs.

Article II. The domicile of this corporation shall be at Lawtell in the Parish of St. Landry, State of Louisiana, where all citations and other legal process shall be served, the President, and in case of his absence upon the Vice-President, or in the event of the absence of both the President and Vice-President on the Secretary-Treasurer.

Article III. The object and purposes for which this corporation is organized and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are hereby declared to be as follows, to-wit:  
To establish and operate warehouses, yards and store rooms for handling, storing, weighing, sampling and shelling cotton, cottonseed, and other farm products; to own and operate a cotton gin or gins; to do a general brokerage and commission business in all farm products; to own and operate rice, sugar and syrup mills to manufacture and sell bricks and cement blocks; to operate wood and lumber yards; to operate a cannery plant for preserving fruits and vegetables and to manufacture vinegar pickles, etc.; to buy and sell all necessary raw materials, and to handle all by-products of the things so manufactured; and to carry on in connection therewith a general mercantile business, and to do any and all things incidental and germane to the objects and purposes herein set forth.

Article IV. The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of twenty thousand dollars, divided into two thousand shares of the par value of ten dollars each. The amount of each share shall be paid for in cash or its equivalent and this corporation shall become a going concern when five hundred shares shall have been subscribed and paid for.

Article V. All the corporate power of this corporation shall be vested in a board of directors, to be composed of five stockholders, and the management of the business shall be in the hands of the board. The members of the said board shall be elected annually on the second Tuesday of March of each and every year, commencing in the hands of the board. The members of said board shall hold office until their successors have been elected and qualified. Any vacancy occurring in their body shall be filled by the remaining members of the board. The board shall have power to make all rules and regulations for their own government and the proper conduct of the affairs of the corporation. They shall elect from their own number a President, Vice-President and a Secretary and Treasurer, but however the offices of Secretary and Treasurer shall be combined into one office as the board may from time to time direct. Until the election to be held by the stockholders on the second Tuesday of March, 1913, as hereinafter provided, the said board shall consist of W. C. Dejean as President, J. S. Evans as Vice-President, and Dr. Paul Foster as Secretary-Treasurer. Three members of the said board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article VI. The capital stock of this corporation may be increased at any time in accordance with the laws of the State. This charter may be amended, altered or changed or the corporation dissolved by a vote of two-thirds of the stockholders voting by shares at a meeting convened for that purpose after thirty days' previous notice of such meeting as shall have been given such stockholder by letter and by publication in one or more newspapers published in the Parish of St. Landry.

Article VII. No stockholder of this corporation shall be held liable for any of the debts, liabilities, or contracts thereof in any further sum than the unpaid balance due the corporation on the shares owned by him, nor shall any informality in the organization have the effect of rendering this charter null or of exposing a shareholder to any liability whatever.

Article VIII. A failure at any time to hold meetings or elect directors or officers as herein provided, shall not work a forfeiture of this Charter or dissolve the corporation, but the existing board of directors and officers shall continue until their successors have been chosen by election, which election shall be held as soon as possible.

Article IX. At the expiration of this Charter and after the dissolution, the affairs shall be liquidated by commissioners to be elected by the stockholders, and said commissioners are invested with full powers to liquidate the affairs of the corporation, and said commissioners to be three in number and to be selected or elected in such manner as the stockholders may designate.
