To the members of the Board of Aldermen of the City of Opelousas, La. Gentlemen: You are hereby notified that there will be a special meeting of your Honorable Board this, Friday, evening, May 9th, 1913, at five p. m., for the purpose of considering and adopting measures to incur debt and to issue negotiable gold bonds therefor for the purpose of paving and improving the streets or alleys of the City of Opelousas.

Opelousas, La., May 9th, 1913.

The Board of Aldermen met pursuant to the above call, Present E. L. Loeb, Mayor presiding; Aldermen, Shaw, Blacksher, Daniel Dunbar. There being a quorum present the meeting was called to order.

AN ORDINANCE.
NO. 8 OF 1913.

To incur debt and to issue negotiable gold bonds therefor for the purpose of paving and improving the streets or alleys of the City of Opelousas, in accordance with paragraph 4 of Article 281 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana, as amended by Joint Resolution of the General Assembly of said State being No. 132 of the Acts of the year 1912, approved July 4, 1912, and duly ratified by a vote of the people on Tuesday, November 5, 1912.

Whereas, the paving and improvement of certain streets of the City of Opelousas and the building of good substantial bridges thereon are matters of the greatest public concern; and

Whereas, the statutory, necessary and usual charges of the said City for the current year do not exceed seven mills on the dollar per annum on the assessed value of the taxable property of the City, and will not exceed that millage during the ten years commencing with the year 1914 and ending with the year 1923, both inclusive; and

Whereas, the City can therefore, after making provision for the payment of all statutory, ordinary and usual charges, set aside and fund into bonds running for a period not exceeding ten years and bearing interest at a rate not exceeding five per cent per annum, three mills of the ten mills tax authorized by Article 232 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana, for the purpose of providing funds for paving or otherwise improving the streets or alleys of the City of Opelousas; which said millage will support in principal and interest a bond issue of thirty-six Thousand Dollars (\$36,000.00);

Therefore, be ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Opelousas in special session convened in section 1, That a debt of thirty-six Thousand Dollars (\$36,000.00) be and the same is hereby incurred, to be evidenced by bonds to be executed and issued as hereinafter provided.

Section 2. That the Mayor and the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen be and they are hereby authorized and directed to have prepared and to execute under the seal of this City, Seventy-two (72) negotiable coupon gold bonds to be known and designated as Street Paving and Improvement Bonds of the City of Opelousas, La., and to be numbered from one to seventy-two, both numbers inclusive and of the denomination of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) each, to be dated May 1st, 1913, and bearing interest at the rate of five per cent (5%) per annum from date until paid, payable annually on the 1st day of May of each and every year, and the principal and interest of said bonds to be payable at the office of the Treasurer of the City of Opelousas, in said City, and said bonds to be due and payable as follows:

The interest of said bonds shall be evidenced by proper coupons attached to each bond, and both coupons and interest shall be payable in gold coin of the United States of America at the then present standard of weight and fineness. Said coupons may be exchanged by fac-simile signatures of the Mayor and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen.

Section 3. Each of said bonds and each of said interest coupons to be attached to said bonds, in form substantially as follows, to-wit:

Know all men by these presents, That the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Opelousas, Louisiana, acknowledge themselves to be indebted, and for value received hereby promise to pay to bearer the sum of

FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS

upon the 1st day of May, A. D., 19____, together with interest thereon from date until paid at the rate of Five per cent (5%) per annum, payable annually on the 1st day of May of each and every year until final payment hereof upon the presentation and surrender of this bond and the interest coupons thereto attached as they severally become due.

Both principal and interest of this bond are due and payable at the office of the Treasurer of the City of Opelousas, La., in said City, in gold coin of the United States of America, at the then present standard of weight and fineness.

This bond is one of a series of Seventy-two (72) bonds, of the tenor and amount, issued for the purpose of providing funds for the paving and improvement of the streets or alleys of the City of Opelousas, under and in pursuance of and in conformity to paragraph 4 of Article 281 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana, as amended by Joint Resolution of the General Assembly of the said State being No. 132 of the Acts of the year 1912, approved July 4, 1912, and duly ratified by a vote of the people on Tuesday, November 5, 1912.

It is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things required to be done by the Constitution and statutes of the State of Louisiana and precedent to and necessary in issuing this bond have been regularly done and performed to the full extent and to the satisfaction of the Board of Aldermen of said City of Opelousas, including this bond, does not exceed any constitutional or statutory limitation, and that three mills of the ten mills tax authorized by Article 232 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana, for the ten years beginning with the year 1914 and ending with the year 1923, both inclusive, have been specifically and irrevocably authorized and dedicated to


