AN ORDINANCE.

NO. 9 OF 1913.

To grant to the New Orleans Texas & Mexico Railroad Company the right, in addition to its present rights along Chaney Street, to close the said street to public traffic or public use for its entire width from the west side of Walnut street to the east side of Union street.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Opelousas, La., (in regular meeting assembled) that the New Orleans Texas & Mexico Railroad Company be, and it is hereby granted, in addition to its present rights along Chaney street in this City, the right to close all traffic and business, except those directly connected with the said railroad company, the said Chaney street for its entire width between the west side of Walnut street and the east side of Union street, provided the said N. O. T. & M. R. R. Co. shall keep open at all times their yard in the rear of their depot for public use.

Section 2. Be it further ordained that for good and sufficient reasons this ordinance go into effect immediately after its passage.

ORDINANCE NO 10 OF 1913.

An ordinance amending and re-enacting section 11 of an ordinance adopted March 4th, 1893, entitled "An ordinance providing better police regulations for the town of Opelousas, La., and repealing all ordinances in conflict therewith."

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Opelousas, La., that section 11 of an ordinance adopted March 4th, 1893, entitled "An ordinance providing better police regulations for the town of Opelousas, La., and repealing all ordinances in conflict therewith be amended and re-enacted so as to read as follows:

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained that any person found guilty of violating any section of the foregoing ordinance who is in default in the payment of the fine imposed shall be compelled to work on the streets at one dollar per day of ten hours until such fine and costs shall be paid, and, personally, unless the party concerned be a woman, when the imposing of the sentence shall be left to the discretion of the trial judge.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that for good and sufficient reasons this ordinance shall take effect from and after its adoption.

I further affirm that I am an old citizen of the town, deeply interested in its good name and fair reputation, and do not think that any advantage should be taken of any citizen whereby he would be deprived of his property without due compensation.

The Board of Aldermen met pursuant to the above call. Present E. L. Loeb, Mayor, presiding; Aldermen, Shy, Blacksher, Daniel Dunbar. There being a quorum present the meeting was called to order.

AN ORDINANCE.
NO. 8 OF 1913.

To incur debt and to issue negotiable coupon gold bonds therefor for the purpose of paving and improving the streets or alleys of the City of Opelousas, in accordance with paragraph 4 of Article 281 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana, as amended by Joint Resolution of the General Assembly of said State being No. 132 of the Acts of the year 1912, approved July 9, 1912, and duly ratified by a vote of the people on Tuesday, November 5, 1912.

Whereas, the paving and improvement of certain streets of the City of Opelousas and the building of good substantial bridges thereon are matters of the greatest public concern; and whereas, the statutory, necessary and usual charges of the said City for the current year do not exceed seven mills on the dollar per annum on the assessed value of the taxable property of the City, and will not exceed that millage during the ten years commencing with the year 1914 and ending with the year 1923, both inclusive; and whereas, the City can therefore, after making provision for the payment of all statutory, ordinary and usual charges, set aside a fund for the running for a period not exceeding ten years and bearing interest at a rate not exceeding five per cent per annum, three mills of the ten mill tax authorized by Article 282 of the Constitution

of the State of Louisiana, for the purpose of providing funds for paving or otherwise improving the streets or alleys of the City of Opelousas; which said millage will support in principal and interest a bond issue of thirty-six Thousand Dollars (\$36,000.00);

Therefore, be ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Opelousas in special session convened:

Section 1. That a debt of Thirty-six Thousand Dollars (\$36,000.00) be and the same is hereby incurred, to be evidenced by bonds to be executed and issued as hereinafter provided.

Section 2. That the Mayor and the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen be and they are hereby authorized and directed to have prepared and to execute under the seal of this City, Seventy-two (72) negotiable coupon gold bonds to be known and designated as Street Paving and Improvement Bonds of the City of Opelousas, La., and to be numbered from one to seventy-two, both numbers inclusive and of the denomination of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) each, to be dated May 1st, 1913, and bearing interest at the rate of five per cent (5%) per annum from date until paid, payable annually on the 1st day of May of each and every year, and the principal and interest of said bonds to be payable at the office of the Treasurer of the City of Opelousas, in said City, and said bonds to be due and payable as follows:

The interest of said bonds shall be evidenced by proper coupons attached to each bond, and both principal and interest shall be payable in gold coin of the United States of America at the then present standard of weight and fineness. Said coupons may be executed by fac-simile signatures of the Mayor and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen.

Section 3. Each of said bonds and each of said interest coupons to be attached thereto shall be in form substantially as follows, to-wit:

Know all men by these presents, That the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Opelousas, Louisiana, acknowledge themselves to be indebted, and for value received hereby promise to pay to bearer the sum of

FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS
upon the 1st day of May, A. D., 19—, together with interest thereon from date hereof until paid at the rate of five per cent (5%) per annum, payable annually on the 1st day of May of each and every year until final payment hereof upon the presentation and surrender of this bond and the interest coupons thereto attached as they severally become due.

Both principal and interest of this bond are due and payable at the office of the Treasurer of the City of Opelousas, in said City, in regular coin of the United States of America, at the then present standard of weight and fineness.

This bond is one of a series of Seventy-two (72) bonds, of like date, tenor and amount, issued for the purpose of providing funds for the paving and improvement of the streets or alleys of the City of Opelousas, under and in pursuance of an ordinance, to-wit: paragraph 4 of Article 281 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana, as amended by Joint Resolution of the General Assembly of the said State being No. 132 of the Acts of the year 1912, approved July 9, 1912, and duly ratified by a vote of the people on Tuesday, November 5, 1912.

It is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things required to be done by the Constitution and statutes of the State of Louisiana and precedent to and necessary in issuing this bond have been regularly done and performed; that the total indebtedness of said City of Opelousas, including this bond, does not exceed any constitutional or statutory limitation, and that three mills of the ten mill tax authorized by Article 232 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana, for the ten years beginning with the year 1914 and ending with the year 1923, both inclusive, have been specifically and irrevocably authorized and dedicated to the payment of said bonds in principal and interest at the same time and date.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF
the said Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Opelousas, State of Louisiana, have caused this bond to be signed by the Mayor and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen of said (SEAL) City, and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, and the interest coupons hereunto attached to be executed by fac-simile signatures of said Mayor and Clerk, on this 1st day of the month of May, A. D., 1913.

Section 4. That three mills of the ten mill tax authorized by Article 232 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana, for each of the ten years beginning with the year 1914 and ending with the year 1923, both inclusive, be and the same is specifically and irrevocably authorized and dedicated to the payment of the debt of Thirty-Six Thousand Dollars (\$36,000) hereinafore incurred, and the principal and interest of the bonds evidencing said debt and hereinabove fully described and authorized to be executed and issued.

Section 5. That the Mayor be and he is hereby authorized to negotiate for the sale of said bonds, and to sell the same on the best terms obtainable provided that same be sold for not less than par.

Section 6. That all ordinances or resolutions of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen contrary to or inconsistent with this ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed, and that this ordinance for good and sufficient reasons shall take effect from and after its passage.


