THE PARISH EXHIBIT

The Clarion takes much pleasure in noting the fact that a farmers' exhibit and fair is to be held in our city on Saturday, August 30, 1913.

The plan for the fair has the substantial backing of a number of our leading citizens, and is heartily endorsed by all classes of our people. A fund is being raised for cash premiums to be distributed to the best exhibits of agricultural products, livestock, poultry, etc., with the following representative committee to judge of the merits of the exhibits and distribute the cash prizes and testimonials of merit, namely: R. Lee Mills, Chairman; Edgar Dupre, Joseph McClelland, Louis Hebert, J. J. Thompson, C. M. Kilpatrick, W. C. Clifton and Dr. Paul Foster.

The Committee of Arrangements consists of the following named persons: Dr. Charles F. Boagni, Chairman; Dr. John A. Haas, J. G. Lawler, Thos. H. Lewis, Sr., Jas. O. Chachere, Jos. McClelland, E. L. Loeb, T. S. Isaacks, and Lorenzo Mornhinveg.

Special prominence will be given to the corn exhibits. Cash prizes being awarded to exhibitors of the first, second and third exhibits in point of excellence. Cash prizes will be awarded for the best exhibits of native grown potatoes, sweet and Irish, cotton grown on the stalk, sugar cane, rice, sugar cane syrup, and for fruit and garden products, a list of which will be found in this issue of our paper.

General interest is felt and expressed in the coming fair, which is intended to be the forerunner of the organization of a permanent Parish Fair Association, plans for which are already being considered.

The Clarion congratulates the gentlemen who are promoting this useful public enterprise and pledges to them its earnest support.

We urge our farmers throughout the parish to take an interest in the fair and to attend the same. Nothing can be done

more valuable to the public generally and to the farming element than this farmers' exhibit of the products of their farms. The present time is peculiarly appropriate to hold such a fair as our parish is blessed with bumper crops of every kind of agricultural products, and our farmers generally are in a more cheerful and hopeful frame of mind.

One of the subjects that will receive consideration and that will be discussed, is the establishment here of a permanent market for the sale of our surplus corn, potatoes, truck and every species of farm products.

The best speakers on agricultural subjects will address our people on that occasion, including Dr. W. R. Dodson, Director of the State Experiment Station, A. R. Barracks, Secretary-Manager of the Louisiana Publicity Commission, F. S. White, Agricultural and Horticultural Agent for the Frisco Lines, and others.

No parish in the State is better situated to organize and maintain a first-class fair association than the parish of St. Landry, and we are glad to announce that there are citizens behind the present plan whose names furnish an ample guarantee that the plan will be a success.

The Clarion urges everybody to do everything in their power to make the coming fair a grand opening success.

GET TOGETHER, STAY TOGETHER.

A wise and timely slogan, no more applicable, however, to thirteen parishes of South West Louisiana than to the smallest community or the state at large. The getting together of the S. W. Louisiana district was characterized as a scientifically built organization, built by design and not by accident.

The plan, both in conception and execution, showed a high class of brain work and the finished article is one which if particularly remarkable because of the absence of those flaws so common to like organizations, mainly sectional jealousy and personal exploitation.

Local organizations throughout the state are constantly being formed and the idea of coordinating the effort of the unit organizations into a definitely outlined district seems to have found its first tangible expression in the organization of the South West Louisiana Development Bureau.

Question: Will this have a tendency to diminish the local pride and interest in local organizations?
Decidedly, No! On the contrary, a spirit of friendly emulation is a logical result of fraternal contact with neighboring communities and more practical and aggressive constructive and development work is the inevitable result.

This same logic, as applied to communities and districts, applies in a like manner to districts and the state. There are

but few a problems of a local nature which do not interest the entire state and the concentrated effort of a well organized statewide force applied in an effort to solve one problem will afford quicker results and more general relief than can possibly be afforded by many times the energy and effort applied without organization and co-operation.

In order to interest men and money in Opelousas it is first necessary to satisfy the prospective newcomer or investor that Louisiana is a desirable state to live and invest in. One of the most convincing booklets ever published by a southern land company was a recent publication of a Georgia company. In an elaborate forty-page booklet, thirty pages were devoted to the South as a whole, six pages to the county (parish) and four pages to the specific proposition offered for sale.

This booklet was a famous business getter. A single exhibit of the product of one farm by one man, no matter how meritorious, attracts but passing comment. A competitive exhibit excites general interest and comment.

Every district as well as every community has some particularly attractive feature to offer as an emphasis to the general invitation to come to Louisiana; combine all these attractions and the invitation will be heard and answered.

Cheese Squares

Out of a pint of milk take enough to wet up a quarter of a cup each of flour and corn starch seasoned with half a teaspoonful each of salt paprika. Add this to the remainder of the scalded in a double boiler. Stir constantly until the mixture thickens, then occasionally for twenty minutes. Add yolks of two eggs beaten up with a quarter cup of creamed butter and half a cup of grated cheese. As soon as these are cooked, turn out into a shallow pan and when cold cut in shapes, lay these in a baking pan apart from from each other; cover thickly with greated cheese; reheat and brown in a hot oven.


