

By virtue of a judgment of the Hon. B. H. Favy, Judge of the Sixteenth Judicial District Court, of Louisiana, rendered on the 11th day of August, 1913, in the above numbered and entitled suit, and pursuant to a commission to me directed by Henry Lestap, Clerk of said Court, and of same date, I will proceed to sell at public auction, to the last and highest bidder, at the principal front door of the Court House, in the City of Opelousas, La., on

Tuesday, Sept. 23, 1913,
at 11 o'clock a. m., the following property belonging to the Opelousas Sugar Company, Limited, to-wit:

FIRST.

A certain tract or parcel of land, situated in the Parish of St. Landry, La., about one and one-half miles southwest of the city of Opelousas, and described in an act of sale by B. Bennett to the Opelousas Sugar Company, Ltd., of date May 19, 1911, by act of sale before J. P. Dunbar, Notary Public, duly recorded in the Clerk's Office, Parish of St. Landry, May 22, 1911, viz:

Starting at a point on the continuation of section line between sections 57 and 58, township 6, south range 8 east, 2811.5 feet from the intersection of this line with the center line of the public road from Opelousas to Church Point, running north eighty-three degrees and thirty minutes east, a distance of 281.5 feet to a point on this section line between sections 57 and 58; thence south three degrees and no minutes east, a distance of 79.2 feet; thence south 85 degrees and 50 minutes west, a distance of 61.3 feet; thence in a northerly direction to a point on the center line of the public road, together with all the appurtenances connected with or forming part of the sugar refinery plant, situated upon said tract of land, saving and excepting the six roller mill, engine, chain carrier, saw wheels, which were sold to the company by Dr. W. A. Hallway and which has been ordered by judgment of court to be separately sold; and saving and excepting two return tubular boilers which were heretofore sold to the Albert Hanson Lumber Company, the dynamo sold to B. Bennett, and saving and excepting the building in which the sugar making machinery is located, and one acre of ground upon which said building is situated, which has been ordered to be separately sold by judgment of the court. SECOND.

One 1-2 foot six roller mill made by Whitney Iron works in 1884, together with engine, carrier chain and all extra crown wheels.

THIRD.

The building in which the plant is situated, together with the acre of land upon which it is situated.

Terms and Conditions.—The tract of twelve acres, together with all of the appurtenances situated thereon and connected with the sugar refinery, saving and excepting the property above mentioned as ordered to be separately sold, will be included in the adjudication to the highest bidder.
The property described under number three, namely, "The building and ground upon which it is situated" will be separately sold for cash. The balance of the property will be sold for one-third of the purchase price payable in cash, and the balance payable in twelve months from date of sale, bearing 9 per cent per annum interest.

The purchaser of the larger tract with the appurtenances sold therewith, being required to execute his note secured by special mortgage and vendor's lien on the property sold to him, the note to bear 9 per cent per annum interest from date of sale, and to contain a clause for the payment of attorney's fees in case they be incurred by the purchaser.
The purchaser of the six roller mill, engine, etc., will be required to give bond for the payment of this credit portion of the purchase price. Should the vendor of the mill, engine, etc., become the purchaser of the property upon which he claims the vendor's privilege, the bond to be executed by him, for the credit portion of the purchase price would be so conditioned as to obligate him to pay only such portion of the purchase price as might be adjudged by the court to be due by him as his contribution toward the payment of the legal costs and charges, should there not be sufficient funds for that purpose realized by the sale of other portions of the property.

Board of Health.

The Board of Health of the City of Opelousas met this day with the following members present, viz: J. A. Haas, C. F. Bogani, L. H. Mornhinveg and B. A. Littell.

On motion duly seconded and carried the following ordinance was adopted:

AN ORDINANCE

An ordinance providing that all hotels, restaurants, barber shops, public baths, banks, and other public places, and all private residences having cesspools, all public stables, laundries and all places where large quantities of water are used for motive power or other purposes, shall connect with the sewerage system in the City of Opelousas, and providing the penalties for failure to do so.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Board of Health of the City of Opelousas, That all owners, lessees, and managers of hotels, restaurants, barber shops, public baths, banks, and other public places in the City of Opelousas, and all private residences having cesspools, all public stables, laundries, and

all places where large quantities of water are used for motive power or other purposes, shall, within thirty days after the passage of this ordinance, connect with the sewerage system of the City of Opelousas, for the disposal of the sewerage of such hotels, restaurants, banks, and other public places and private residences.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That public places within the meaning of this ordinance are such as have within them closets or toilets for public use, or for the use of others than the owners, lessees, or managers of such premises.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That for failure to connect with the sewerage system of the City of Opelousas, as herein provided, such owner, lessee, or manager, shall, on conviction by any court of competent jurisdiction, be fined not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$25.00, or suffer imprisonment for not more than thirty days, or both, at the discretion of the Court.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That for good and sufficient cause this ordinance shall take effect from date of its passage.
