## Home, Farm and Fireside

From Farm Exchanges.

### CHILDREN SHOWING OLDER PEOPLE HOW TO FARM

In the current issue of Farm and Fireside, appears the following account of corn-growing contests:

"The big prize in the boys' corn contest went to the South as usual. It was won by Walter Lee Dunston of Alabama, with an yield from an acre of 232.7 bushels. This beats the former record of 228.75, which went to Jerry Moore of South Carolina. And it beats it in two ways; for while the former high yield cost in the growing 42 cents a bushel, young Dunston secured his great yield at a cost of only 19.9 cents a bushel. This is a wonderful triumph. And it may well be studied by cotton-planters in the South and corn-growers in the North. Where is the future corn belt to be located anyhow?"

"The Southern girls carried off the prizes too, in canning and tomato work. Miss Clyde Sullivan of Georgia put up 2,464 cans from 5,354 pounds she grew from an acre. But the Northern girls did almost as well, though the second prize, too, went to Dixie. However, the matter is not quite settled as between Miss Lizzie Kelley of South Carolina, whose record seems to be 4,375 pounds, and Miss Lucy Bale of New Jersey, who grew 3,980 pounds.

"The best record of a Northern boy was made by Arthur W. Rufin of Grundy county, Iowa. His yield was 136.7 bushels. His cost of growing is not given, but it is safe to say that the record is no better in this respect than that of the Southern boy with his record yield grown for 19

cents a bushel. These contests are of enormous importance. The children are showing the older people what can be done."

In the current issue of Farm and Fireside, the national farm paper published at Springfield, Ohio, appears an editorial showing how American farmers got bumper returns from their crops last year even if they did not get bumper crops. Following is an extract:

"The U. S. D. A. has made determinations which show that the cash value of the 1913 farm produce of the United States is greater than ever before in our history. The cash income of the farmers is estimated at \$5,847,000,000 after retaining on the farm what is needed for maintenance. This is twice as much as we produced in 1899—in money value. We must not confuse money value with yield per acre, for the two have no close relation. Neither must we assume that the farmers are better off by the full amount of the increase in cash values; for the cost of living on farms as elsewhere. But there can be no doubt that the splendid returns from the farms this year is the brightest spot in our national situation. For five years financial conditions all over the world have been getting more and more unsatisfactory, and this season may be the bottom of the 'low.' Let us hope so. Fair crops brought us more money than bumper crops would have done, and will go far toward giving a firm basis to business. The grists from farms will keep city mills grinding."

### Not a "Glorious" Victory.

Opelousas, Feb. 23, 1914.

Mr. Editor:

In your last issue you announce in box car letters that the result of our recent municipal contest was a glorious victory. Permit me to dissent from any such conclusion.

Never in the history of Opelousas were such grave charges made against a candidate for the mayoralty as were made against the successful candidate by a responsible correspondent through your widely circulated paper. Never were such charges made with more clearness, more directness, more circumstantiality, and never was a better opportunity offered to refute them if unfounded or incorrect. This terrific arraignment was side-stepped by Mayor Loeb and never pleaded by any of his supporters. Although he rushed into print and attacked and

slandered his accuser, he never attempted to deny a single one of these damning charges, which impugned his good faith, his honesty and integrity, never even attempted to explain away a solitary one! And the reason is simple enough. He could not; for every one of these charges was founded on facts indelibly written in the public records.

One would suppose that in a Christian community such a man, under such conditions, would have withdrawn from the field. Yet, out of a vote of 400 he was elected by 26 majority (one vote for his opponent was thrown out). And this you call a glorious victory!

Now, speaking for myself and for the very respectable minority who supported Dr. Shaw, against whom the breath of scandal was never whispered, I must say that, a distinctively moral question having been raised and having been so cavalierly flouted by the solid Jew vote and even by a small majority of the Christians, we cannot but sincerely deplore the result, for we feel that it will have the most deleterious and debasing effects upon the community.

## ATTAKAPAS YOUTH ATTAINS HIGH HONORS

Very Rev. Jules B. Jeanmard Is Appointed Chancellor Of Diocese.

It is always a pleasure to record the rise of any home boy to high honors at the bench in legislative halls or the fields of finance or the amphitheater of the medical and surgical world, but it is a rare privilege to see one of them reach the upper strata of the church. So it is with genuine pleasure and enthusiasm, that we note the advancement of Reverend Father Jeanmard to the responsible position of Chancellor of the Diocese and "Vicar General in Spirituabilibus" by his Grace Most Reverend Archbishop James Blenk.

Father Jeanmard was born in our sister-parish of St. Martin, at Breaux Bridge August 15, 1879. His venerable father is now a resident of Carencro and and his brothers, Frank and Charles live in Lafayette, George resides in Ville Platte, and Raoul

is a prominent druggist of Thibodeaux.

All the members of the family have the respect of the communities in which they were born and where they now live, which goes to illustrate the value of good pious parentage.

It was but natural in such a pious home, the pious inclination of Jules should find early expression so that at the tender age of 13 he had determined to consecrate his life to the service of the Master and to become a priest. With that purpose he entered St. Joseph's Divcasan Seminary at Gessen, La., conducted by the Benedictine Fathers, where for five years he prosecuted the classical studies of the theological course, at the expiration of which he took up the philosophical course of the first year at Holy Cross College, in New Orleans. The second year course was taken by him at Kenrick's Seminary, in St. Louis. Upon the opening of the St. Louis Theological Seminary at St. Stephens Church, in New Orleans, young Jeanmard entered to complete the course under the tuition of the Vincentian Fathers.

On the 11th of June 1903,
