Dr. F. O. Pavy offered the following ordinance and upon being duly read was adopted unanimously, to-wit:

AN ORDINANCE.

Amending Sections 2 and 3 of the ordinance of the Police Jury of the parish of St. Landry, adopted at its meeting held on February 2nd, 1914, and being entitled an "Ordinance relative to the construction and building of permanent gravel roads in the parish of St. Landry, and the setting aside of a fixed sum therefor and the appointment of a committee to supervise the same."

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the parish of St. Landry, in regular session convened, that sections two and three of the ordinance entitled "An ordinance relative to construction and building of permanent gravel roads in the parish of St. Landry, and the setting aside of a fixed sum therefor and the appointment of a committee to supervise the same," adopted Feb. 2nd, 1914, be amended and re-enacted so as to read as follows:

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That the President of this body, the Supervisor of public roads and one member of this body to be selected and appointed by the President, be and they are hereby constituted a committee on good roads whose duty it shall be to supervise, superintend, build or have built, by contract or otherwise, the building of gravel roads as provided for by this ordinance and between the points hereinafter mentioned, etc.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That said committee on good roads be and it is hereby empowered and authorized to use out of the above mentioned funds set aside for the building of said permanent roads a sum not to exceed eight thousand dollars for the purchase of any and all machinery, tools, graders, etc., necessary for the building of said gravel roads, and said committee is hereby further authorized to purchase such material and to contract for such labor as may be required to build and construct said roads and to issue vouchers for such material purchased or labor performed, which vouchers, when properly signed, on presentation, shall be paid by the Clerk of this body, by warrant against said permanent road fund, duly signed by the President of this body.

Sec. 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That the provisions of the ordinance adopted on Feb. 2, 1914, in conflict with this ordinance, be and the same is hereby repealed and that this ordinance for good and sufficient reason take effect from and after its passage.

Adopted March 2, 1914. FRANK DIMMECK, President. Attest: J. J. HEALEY, Clerk. The President of this body appointed Mr. J. T. St. Cyr, a member of the committee on good roads, as per instructions of the above ordinance. march 7-6t
