 Gentlemen: I beg to report that I have received from the 1st of July 1914, to the 31st of July, 1914, six hundred and thirty-two out of their fines on the streets, to-wit: total time worked, 105 1-2 days. I have worked 72 squares of streets; hauled 8 cart loads of sand on paved street crossings; put in 2 new wooden bridges, 7 new foot bridges; cleaned out 4 acres of canal, unloaded 2 cars gravel; 8 days sprinkling streets; swept the paved streets 6 days per week and patched a number of bridges. The approximate cost of work done in each ward for July 1914, is as follows:

 On motion duly seconded and carried all reports were received as read. The report of the city Treasurer was referred to the Finance committee, who, after examining and finding same correct, ordered that the Treasurer be credited with the sum of \$1945.71 and vouchers for said amount be cancelled.
 Motion by Mr. Eastham, duly seconded and carried, that a committee be appointed to draft a new ordinance regulating the water and light rates for this city. The mayor appoints Messrs. Eastham, Jones and Fields.
 Motion by Mr. Eastham, duly seconded and carried, that communication of D'avy & Reynolds be received and laid over to next meeting.
 Motion by Mr. Gosselin, duly seconded that a committee be appointed to obtain insurance rates from the different Agencies for the city's insurance expiring and that the business be given the agency offering the best rates.
 Motion carried.
 The mayor appointed Messrs. Gosselin Eastham and Hays.
 Moved by Mr. Gosselin that the City Attorney be requested to prepare necessary resolution or ordinance for graveled Main street from Church street to Ringrose Gulley. Motion seconded and carried.
 Motion by Mr. Stelly, that Mr. A. Mores be given permission to place coal cinders on Market street from Landry to Vine streets, under the direction of the Street Commissioner. Motion seconded and carried.
 Motion by Mr. Eastham, that the city sell to the property owners gravel necessary to construct their driveways on the gravel streets in compliance with the city ordinance. Motion seconded and carried.
 The mayor notified the Board that he had remitted fines imposed on the several automobile owners and drivers who were fined for violating the automobile ordinance relative to blowing the horn at street corners for the following reasons: That the said ordinance had been attacked and was declared invalid and that inasmuch as the court had held same to be ineffective and incapable of enforcement, that he, as Mayor, did not think it just or fair to impose a fine upon those who refused to attack the ordinance, but plead guilty and paid their fines under an ordinance that was subsequently declared null and void and accordingly requested the Board to approve of his course in this matter.
 On motion Mr. Eastham, that the fines remitted by the Mayor as stated above be and the same is hereby approved. Motion seconded and carried.
 AN ORDINANCE.
 Number 11 of 1914.
 An ordinance authorizing the Mayor of the city of Opelousas, La., to advertise for bids for the construction of certain sidewalks, curbing and appurtenances, within the corporate limits of the city in accordance with Section No. 2 of Act No. 147 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana for the year 1902, as amended by Act 49 of the year 1912 and prescribing in what manner same shall be constructed.
 Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the city of Opelousas, La., in regular session convened that the mayor be and he is hereby authorized to advertise for sealed bids, for the construction of sidewalks, curbing and appurtenances, on the following streets in the city of Opelousas, La., in accordance with the provision of Section No. 2 of Act No. 147 of the General Assembly of the state of Louisiana for the year 1902 as amended by Act 49 of 1912, to-wit:
 Vine street from S. P. R. R. to Lombard street on south side.
 Walnut street from South street to Vine street on east side.
 Lombard street from South street to Vine street on west side.
 Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that said call for bids for the construction of said sidewalks, curbing and appurtenances shall be by first class walks as established by plans and specifications on file in the office of the City Engineer, which shall be open for inspection and examination of each prospective bidder.
 Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that the said call for bids shall contain the reservation right of the Board of Aldermen to reject any and all bids.
 Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., that the entire cost of construction for said sidewalks, curbing and appurtenances shall be borne by the abutting property owners on the said streets along which side the said sidewalks, curbs and appurtenances are to be constructed in proportion to the frontage owned by them.
 Section 5. Be it further ordained, etc., that this ordinance is intended to carry out the provisions of Section 2 of Act No. 147 of the General Assembly of the state of Louisiana for the year 1902 as amended by Act No. 49 for the year 1912.
 Section 6. Be it further ordained, etc., that all ordinances or part of ordinances in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.
 Section 7. Be it further ordained, etc., that for good and sufficient cause this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.
