AN ORDINANCE.

Creating an additional election precinct in the 7th Justice's ward of the 4th Police Jury ward, and numbering the said additional voting precinct and establishing the boundaries thereof.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Landry, in regular session convened, that there be and that there is hereby established an additional election precinct in the 7th Justice's ward in and for the 4th Police Jury Ward, to be known as the 8th Election Precinct of the 7th Justice Ward of the 4th Police Jury Ward.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That the boundaries of the said 8th election precinct of the 7th Justice's Ward of the 4th Police Jury Ward be and are hereby established and designated as follows, to-wit: Commencing on the Atchafalaya River at the N E corner of T 5, S R 7 E, and from said T 5 S R 7 E, along the north side of said T 5 S R 7 E, along north side of T 5 S R 6 E, west to the center line of said T 5 S R 6 E, running north and south, thence south along said center line of said township and along the center line of township 5 S R 7 E, to the south line of the Courtableau Bayou, thence southeasterly along the north bank of said Bayou Courtableau to the Atchafalaya River, at the mouth of said bayou, thence northerly along the west bank of said Atchafalaya River to the place of beginning, within which boundary lines the following described property is located and included: Being the E 1-2 of T 5, S R 6 E, all of T 5, S R 7 E, all of the east half of township 6, S R 6 E, which lies north of Bayou Courtableau, all of township 6, S R 7 E, and all of the part of T 7, S R 7 E, which lies north of Bayou Courtableau, all of which is in the parish of St. Landry, state of Louisiana.

LICENSE ORDINANCE.

An ordinance for the levying and collecting of Parish Licenses for the year 1915: Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Landry in regular session convened.

Section 1. That the license laws of the State of Louisiana now in force shall in so far as applicable be the license ordinance of the Parish of St. Landry for the year 1915, except as hereinafter modified and changed:

Section 2. That the annual license for peddlers and peddlers in one and two horse vehicles shall be \$15.00 and \$20.00 respectively.

Section 3. That the amount to be paid as an annual license tax by retail dealers in distilled, alcoholic and malt liquors shall be graded as follows: First Class: When the gross annual sales shall be \$20,000.00 or more, the license shall be \$2,500.00; Second Class: When the gross annual sales shall be less than \$20,000.00 and not more than \$20,000.00 the license shall be \$2,000.00;

Third Class: When the gross annual sales shall be less than \$10,000.00 and not more than \$10,000.00, the license shall be \$1,500.00;

Fourth Class: When the gross annual sales shall be \$10,000.00 or less, the license shall be \$800.00;

Section 4. That this ordinance shall take effect on and after January 1st, 1915.

ANNUAL TAX ORDINANCE.

Whereas, by resolution adopted on October 5th, 1914, this body framed a budget of Eighty-Five Thousand Dollars, (\$85,000.00), as an estimate exhibiting the various items of expenditure that the Parish of St. Landry would require for the year 1915, and

Whereas, said budget has been published in the St. Landry Clarion, the official newspaper of this parish, for the full term of thirty (30) days as the law directs, and

Whereas, an ad valorem tax of ten (10) mills on the dollar of the taxable property of this parish will be required in addition to the revenues to be derived under the license ordinance adopted to meet said budget;


