

MELVILLE PROCEEDINGS.

Melville, La., May 4, 1915.

The Board of Aldermen met in regular session. Present, H. S. Joseph, Mayor, presiding; Aldermen W. T. Smith, P. Glaser, R. H. Jones, C. A. Long and L. H. Lyons.

The minutes of the regular session of Apr. and the special session of April 27 and 30, 1915, were read and approved.

The following reports were read, approved and ordered filed: Report of Town Marshal O. E. Hamilton, for Apr., 1915: \$1678.85.

Report of Town Clerk & Tax Collector, L. H. Lyons: Collections Apr. 7, to May 4, 1915: regular tax, year 1914, \$104.00; special electric tax, year 1914, \$8.08; mercantile licenses year 1915, \$5.00; dog tax, year 1915, \$13.00; sundries 62c; total turned over to Town Treas., \$36.80; also following warrants issued since last regular meeting: Nos. 544 order St. Comr to Joe Nixon putting in 5 bridges, \$2.25; 542 order St. Comr to W. T. Smith raising st. at R R Goose neck, \$5.00; 543 order of Mayor to J. W. Heap, annual premium on bond of Marshal \$5.00, making \$12.25.

Mr. Jones reported the committee had performed their work in having gutters on town hall repaired. Moved by Smith, seconded by Glaser and carried, report be received and committee discharged.

The following bills were read, approved and ordered paid: Bill of O. E. Hamilton for April, 1915; one month salary \$35.00, half of fines \$16.25, cash paid out shells 45c, 9 meals \$1.35, repairing bridge 75c, duster 50c, hauling lumber 50c, to killing 4 dogs \$2.00, total \$66.80.

Bill of L. H. Lyons: salary for Apr., 1915, \$25.00, recording 8 trials \$8.00, 5 per cent commission on collecting (\$36.80) \$1.83, cash paid out for stamps 27c, writing paper 15c, ink 5c, pens 5c, total bill \$12.85.

Bill of Mayor H. S. Joseph: salary for Apr., 1915, \$16.65, expenses to Opelousas in outfit matter \$10.00, telephone Opelousas 21c, total bill \$26.86.

Bill of J. W. Heap: salary as Treasurer for April, 1915, \$1.00.

Bill of St. Landry Clarion: Pub. Ord. No. 50, 4 1/2 sqs. 3 T \$1.80.

Letter from Eunice Star, stating they would publish proceedings of this Board at 5 cents per line for first insertion and 2 1/2 cents per line for each following insertion for 10 point type, was read.

Moved by Smith, seconded by Jones and carried, that the St. Landry Clarion be adopted as the official journal of the Town of Melville.

Moved by Jones, seconded by Glaser, that Geo. Havard be authorized to complete street work on Front St. not to exceed a cost of

\$15.00; vote on this question, yeas Jones and Glaser; nays Long, Smith and Lyons. Motion declared lost.

Moved by Glaser, seconded by Lyons and carried that the Town Marshal be authorized and directed to inspect all privies and box pens, and all places of public nuisance in the Town of Melville, that he instruct parties to make the necessary corrections, and that he be paid for said extra service during May, and that he make full report next regular meeting.

Moved by Smith, seconded by Glaser and carried that contractor be instructed to place 2 oak wood blocks on electric light generator foundation, as per advice of engineer Gray, the town to meet this extra expense.

Moved by Glaser, seconded by Smith and carried, that the Mayor be instructed to appoint a committee to arrange for the celebration of the beginning of the Electric Light System of the Town of Melville.

The Mayor appointed P. Glaser, W. T. Smith and Wm. Hathorn. Moved, seconded and carried to adjourn. H. S. JOSEPH, Mayor. Attest: LYMAN H. LYONS, Clerk.
