



JOHN WANAMAKER.
Wanamaker began his business life as a clerk in a small dry goods store. By thrift and economy he was able to save a part of his earnings. In 1861 he started in business with his brother-in-law with a combined capital of \$2,500. The first thing he did was to hire the best salesmen in town at a salary of \$1,200 a year—nearly a third of his entire capital. His next step was to spend the entire receipts of the first day's sales for an advertisement for the next day's business. These are radical methods but, combined with Mr. Wanamaker's personality, have won for him great success.

It is said of his early business life that many of his customers were country folk, whose trade and friendship he valued very highly. It was his custom to fill his pockets with chestnuts, and slipping some of them into the hands of his customers, he would take them about the store, munching chestnuts as they went. Mr. Wanamaker is now one of the greatest of American merchants. A few years ago he moved into a building built especially for him. It is fifteen stories high, covers three acres and has 1,750,000 square feet of floor space.
