

ORDINANCE NO. 53
An ordinance making it a penalty for any person or persons, company, corporation or otherwise to commence or engage in any kind of business, profession or calling without first having first obtained a license from the Town of Melville, La.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Melville, La., that any person, persons, company, corporation or otherwise who shall commence, engage or carry on any kind of business, trade, profession or calling for profit, for which a license is levied by the Town of Melville, Louisiana, shall before commencing such business, trade, profession or calling first obtain a license from the said Town of Melville, La.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that whoever shall fail to comply with section one of this ordinance shall upon conviction be fined not less than Five (\$5.00) Dollars nor more than Twenty-Five (\$25.00) Dollars and cost of court, and in default of payment of fine and cost shall be imprisoned or worked on the streets within the discretion of the court, or shall suffer both fine and imprisonment or worked on the streets as the court may deem proper.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed, and that this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.

Thus done, and passed in regular session convened on this the 2d day of November, A. D., 1915.
