Daly, Jr., the operation proving successful. The boy's skull was cut and it was feared that the wound might prove fatal.

#### BRIBE CHARGES ARE THROWN OUT OF COURT

Sheriff-Elect of Iberia Parish Is Cleared at Hearing Held at New Iberia

The charges of bribery brought against Sheriff-elect P. A. Landry, of Iberia parish, and Lee and Antoine Gonsoulin were thrown out of court following a hearing Tuesday afternoon before Justice of the Peace J. A. Dugas, a democrat of the fourth Iberia ward.

The charges against Sheriff Landry were based on affidavits sworn to by Eustache Oubre and Louis Elie Dugas, during the early part of last week, in which it was alleged that Sheriff Landry, who is a progressive, had paid the two men certain amounts to support him in the April election.

The case was scheduled for a hearing on Saturday, but through a misunderstanding action was delayed until Tuesday. In the meantime Oubre went before a notary public and swore to a statement that the affidavit accredited to him was obtained under false pretenses. He asserted that he could not read, and after being questioned about an alleged bribe having been offered him by Landry, which he said was not true, he was asked to sign a paper. This paper proved later to be an affidavit attesting that a bribe had been offered to and accepted by Oubre.

### PAVY AND GARLAND TO MAKE THE RACE

Judge and District Attorney Will Offer for Re-Election

PRESENT INCUMBENTS SAY THEY ARE IN CONTEST

Official Announcement of Their Candidacies Expected Within the Next Few Weeks

Judge Benjamin H. Pavy and District Attorney R. Lee Garland will be in the race for re-election to their respective offices in the primary next August. They have made their formal announcement to that effect and expect to officially announce when the proper time presents itself.

Friends of the two incumbents have besieged them with requests as to their intention. On Thursday evening District Attorney Garland stated most emphatically that he would be in the race, stating "My friends feel that I should run for re-election and being entirely at their disposal I see no way out of it."

Judge Pavy has made it known to his friends throughout Evangeline and St. Landry parishes that he too would be in the fray.

Four years ago District Attorney Garland and Judge Pavy were elected without opposition. It is not known whether they will be so fortunate this time.

Attorney Garland has been in the saddle for twenty years, while Judge Pavy was elected in 1910 to serve out the unexpired term of the late illustrious Judge William Perreault.

While Mr. Garland is old in point of service he is still a comparatively young man; he is recognized as one of the ablest lawyers in Louisiana and has made a good record, according to his friends, as district attorney. Judge Pavy, a native of the Grand Coteau section, is also a young man, being several years the junior of District Attorney Garland.

It is very likely that Judge Pavy and District Attorney Garland will be running mates, in the event that opposition to them is brought out.

Eight years ago Mr. Fontenot was a delegate to the Denver convention which nominated William Jennings Bryan. This time he is an elector and will cast his vote for Woodrow Wilson.

### THOUSANDS TO SEE PARADE ON JUNE 3rd

New Orleans Will Demonstrate Its Feeling on Preparedness

CONFEDERATE VETERANS TO BE GUESTS OF HONOR

Railroads from All Over the South Will Bring Thousands of People in New Orleans for Big Parade

New Orleans, May 24.—New Orleans will attest its devotion to the cause of national preparedness June 3rd when it is expected that more than 35000 of its citizens will march through the streets in a great Preparedness Parade. The demonstration will be the most impressive and largest ever held in the South. It will be the South's second largest seaport's declaration of devotion to the Nation and its preservation.

Leading men, earnest women and folks of high and lowly station are at work to make the demonstration a success. To make the movement national and to show the world that America's citizenry stands for proper preparedness the Cities of Milwaukee, St. Louis, Cleveland, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Des Moines, Joliet, Grand Rapids and others will parade on June 3rd.

Shoulder to shoulder in New Orleans, will march men of every walk of life, bank presidents, clerks, and railroad presidents will touch elbows with their workers while professional men, society women and factory girls, the leaders and the led in all walks of life, will catch step and form a most impressive picture.

Confederate Veterans alone will be permitted to ride—everyone else will walk. No uniform, regalia or insignia will detract from the big motive of the marching—the idea of a civic devotion to national preparedness. No advertisements of any kind will be permitted. Uniforms will be limited to the bands, militia and Confederate Veterans. American flags which have been purchased from funds contributed by the populace of the City, will be carried on the shoulder of each marcher. Lapel buttons with a waving American flag alone will be allowed.

Scores of Red Cross nurses will be on hand to take care of any emergency. The procession is expected to go forward with military precision. Forming places of all units are now being chartered on a map by the City engineer. Telephones will be stationed along the streets and with the assistance of Boy Scouts messages will be delivered to each unit.

The executive committee in charge of the affair includes such men as Frank B. Hayne, Chairman; Philip Werlein, Secretary and J. G. Pepper, Treasurer and Col. W. C. Dufour, Grand Marshal.

Everyone is wearing the neat Preparedness button.

The State Legislature has enthusiastically endorsed the movement and will take active part.

Every railroad will run excursions to New Orleans and the carnival crowds are expected to be heavily exceeded.

#### FORMER RESIDENT DIES HERE ON WEDNESDAY

Albert Gosselin, a native of this parish and a former resident of Opelousas, but since a young man a prominent citizen of Marksville, died at the home of his sister-in-law, Mrs. Pierre Titard, in this city, on last Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock.

Mr. Gosselin was the eldest of the well known Gosselin brothers, he being 63 years, two months and 22 days old at the time of his death. His (brothers, prominent and well known citizens of this parish, Judge S. J. Gosselin, of Lewell, L. A. and Louis, of this city, together with the nieces of the deceased accompanied the body to Marksville, departing here on the 9:50 o'clock Texas & Pacific train on Thursday morning.

The deceased came to Opelousas on the 11th so that he could be near the physician of his choice, Dr. B. A. Little; he did not regain his strength and vigor, however, and expired on last Wednesday morning.

Mr. Gosselin moved to Marksville some forty years ago; there he started a blacksmith and wheel-right shop and made a success of life; being a splendid gentleman, well read and conversant on all leading topics of the day, Mr. Gosselin soon became one of the prominent citizens of Avoyelles parish. He was honored by his fellow citizens to the presidency of the police jury of that large and populous parish; was elected mayor of the town of Marksville and also served as a member of the town council.

Besides his three brothers the deceased is survived by his widow and five children, Felix Gosselin, of Echo, and Misses Lucie, Aline, Adele and Lydia Gosselin, who were residing with him up to the time of his death.
