Visitors to the Louisiana State Fair this year, Nov. 1-6, will have the privilege of seeing one of the world's foremost aviators, DeLloyd Thompson, go through his repertoire of marvelous aerial stunts. Thompson's first performance is scheduled for Friday, Nov. 2, and his second appearance is announced for Sunday, Nov. 5. In honor of the famous aviator, one of these days, Friday, is designated Thompson Day, and the other, Sunday, is designated Aviation Day.

**PARISH FAIR CONTEST A STATE FAIR FEATURE.**

With advance information indicating that twenty-five parishes will participate, there is every reason to believe that the 1916 parish fair contest at the Louisiana State Fair, Nov. 1 to 6, will be far superior to all the previous contests in this department. Several parish fair organizations, including some formed this year, will be among the exhibitors, and the rivalry promises to be unusually keen and interesting.

Each parish with an exhibit will be furnished with a booth, 10x20 feet, in the Agricultural Building, so that the exhibits may be attractively arranged and displayed. Besides forming part of the parish exhibit in which they are shown, individual exhibits may also be entered in the general contests for premiums offered for individual displays.

One thousand dollars will be distributed among the ten parishes with the best showing. In addition, the sum of \$100 is given to the parishes exhibiting but not taking any of the parish fair prize money for defraying expenses. The lucky parishes also receive \$50 expense money.

The Agricultural Building will be increased in size this year, 90x110 feet. This will insure room for all.

**MANY PREMIUMS TO JUVENILE FARMERS.**

Premiums aggregating \$2,500 will be distributed among the boys and girls exhibiting in the juvenile farm exposition department at the Louisiana State Fair, Nov. 1 to 6, inclusive. The awards will be made in the Boys' and Girls' Clubs, the Girls' Canning and Home Economics Clubs, Poultry Clubs, Agricultural High Schools, and in plowing, livestock and corn judging contests by juvenile exhibitors.

No branch of the farm extension work in Louisiana has enjoyed greater progress than that of the juvenile farmers. Boys and girls in the various parishes have become actively interested in this work by the thousands, and many of the best farm products are produced by these young men and young women whose success lies in the fact that they are intensely interested in the education they are receiving, which includes instructions in the improved methods of farming. There is great rivalry among their clubs, and judges in the Boys' and Girls' Club department at the State Fair this year, as heretofore, will no doubt have much difficulty in picking the winners. It is expected that the competition this year will be the keenest on record, judging by the reports reaching the headquarters of the fair association and the office of Prof. E. S. Richardson, State Boys' Club agent, agricultural extension department, L. S. U., Baton Rouge.
