


A Red Cross feature at the Princess Theatre Monday night will be the film "In the Ruins of Rheims," one of the interesting moving pictures authorized by the United States and French governments and distributed exclusively through the Divisions of the American Red Cross.

The views were taken in and around the once beautiful but now sadly battered City of Rheims, where our American boys have recently been making history.

Among them are shown the wrecked Cathedral, the ruins of the City

Hall and numerous handsome homes; the famous statue of Joan of Arc, left unharmed; a crater in front of the statue, voluntary distributors of milk, an old woman selling newspapers, and Frenchmen bravely rebuilding what the Germans have destroyed.

Children are also seen cheerfully going to school with gas masks slung over their shoulders. These they quickly put over their faces at a signal from the teacher, and are rushed to places of safety. After the bombardments the children often find their homes in ruins.

BIG REUNION IN OKLAHOMA OIL TOWN THIS YEAR

Number from Opelousas and Surrounding Country Expect to Take In the Blow-out

Mr. C. P. Richard, adjutant of the R. E. Lee Camp of United Confederate Veterans, this week issued the following notice:

A meeting of R. E. Lee Camp will be held on Saturday, September 14, at 3 o'clock p. m., to make final arrangements to go to the reunion. Round trip tickets will be on sale in ample time to leave on the 23d instant and good to return October 31. I have sent for twenty certificates. The rate applies to the following parties: Confederate veterans and members of their families; all members of the United Daughters of the Confederacy may apply to the nearest camp of the U. C. V. for certificates. Free board and lodging will be served to the veterans. Lodging in all hotels during the reunion will range from \$1 to \$2 per day up. Railroad rates to the reunion have been broadened and others may take advantage of the cheap fare to attend the reunion at Tulsa.

OPPORTUNITY

The increase in the number of young people who are ambitious to take business courses is reported from all over the country. The Baton Rouge Business College is sharing this increase to such an extent that the business college buildings must be enlarged in every way. It is the plan of the directors to add five more class rooms on the top floor and place the book-keeping, banking and accounting courses in these class rooms. The bottom floor is to be used exclusively for the typewriting department. More than 50 typewriters of all makes are now in use.

Business education has not received the sympathetic treatment from school authorities generally accorded other less useful subjects, but since the government of the United States has pressed the matter of Commercial Education, these subjects have come into the foreground. The people are demanding commercial subjects and teachers, and it is the intention of the Baton Rouge Business College to place before the young people these opportunities. The government needs right now thousands of women clerks and stenographers for the various departments, and the salaries range from \$1200 a year upward. The government is also building hotels for the exclusive use of clerks in Washington, where board and rooms will be furnished at practically cost.

Never before were opportunities such as these presented to the young men and women of Louisiana and that they are taking advantage of these opportunities can be seen when you visit the Baton Rouge Business College, with its more than 250 students in the Day and Night Schools.

About 15 of the Baton Rouge Business College students in the Book-keeping Department will take the Civil Service examinations on July 30.






A BROOD COOP
