New Schools to Be Opened Next Session

The school board Monday authorized the establishment and reopening of the following schools for the term of 1919-20:

Lower Waxia school to be re-opened and that consolidation with upper Waxia school be suspended until the condition of the roads make feasible the operation of a transfer.

Establishment of a school at Faulkner's Ferry provided that a site for the school and accommodations be secured for a teacher.

Also that a school be established at or near the Veazie settlement on Bayou Jack on the same conditions of the proposed Faulkner's ferry school.

To Turn Old High School Site Into Public Playground

A movement has been initiated among our public spirited citizens to convert the old high school grounds into a public playground for the benefit of the children. This movement is being very favorably received and there is no doubt that they will realize their desires in a short while.

It is proposed to have a swimming pool for the children and other recreational devices that are customarily used on playgrounds so that the grounds will be made into a place for the children.

In due time the matter will be taken before the school board and city council. The Chamber of Commerce has already signified its willingness to endorse and help the proposition.

No Quorum at Chamber of Commerce Last Meeting

At a special meeting of the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce there were not enough members of the board present to constitute a quorum.

An informal discussion of a number of subjects that will be brought up before the meeting of the directors in the next meeting, Wednesday night, April 23rd, was had.

During the discussion it was brought out that a number of those who had signed for membership were very slow in paying for the shares bought and it is urged that these men meet their obligations promptly so that it will not be necessary to send collectors out for this money.

Cliff Allen Sells Business to Barnett & Manouvrier

On Tuesday of this week the firm Barnett & Manouvrier, composed of J. P. Barnett and A. J. Manouvrier, bought the wholesale grocery business lately conducted by Cliff Allen.

St. Landry Bank Buys School Bonds

At a meeting of the parish school board held on last Monday the bonds of the Eunice school district, amounting to \$40,000, were sold to the St. Landry Bank & Trust Company for par and accrued interest.

This bank won out in the bidding over a number of strong financial institutions from the north and east. There were eleven bidders.

Recommend Employment of Col. School Supervisor

The school board at its last session recommended that a rural school supervisor for the colored schools be employed as a salary of \$1500 per year.

RED CROSS WORKROOM OPENED FOR WORKERS

The Red Cross work rooms are now opened again on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday. Anybody wishing to help sew or knit may call at Red Cross headquarters on Court street.

New Rules for Making Sweaters. Use No. 3 needles for sweater proper. No. 2 for cuffs, 52 stitches. Knit 2, puri 2 for three inches.

Knit 36 ribs plain knitting add 28 sleeves and knit sixteen ribs. Then stitches at each end of the needle for knit 43, bind off 20 for neck and knit back and forth on the last forty three stitches for 4 ribs. This leaves thread at inner edge. Break thread and tie on at neck opening for other shoulder.

Knit back and forth for 4 ribs, then add 20 stitches and take up the other 43 stitches and knit back and forth 16 ribs. Then bind off 28 stitches, knit 52, bind off 28. Break thread and tie on at neck. Knit back and forth for 36 ribs, then puri 2, knit 2, for 3 inches and bind off loosely.

Cuff: Use No. 2 needles. The thread on at bottom of sleeve and take up 36 stitches for cuff, puri 2, knit 2, for one and one half inches; bind off loosely.


