WILL ADOPT PUBLIC SAFETY ORDINANCES

MAYOR BERWICK PROPOSES TO DO AWAY WITH GAMBLERS AND LOAFERS

In last week's issue of the Eunice Gail Mayor Berwick gives the following synopsis of ordinances that will be introduced in the next meeting of the city council of Eunice.

At the last meeting of the grand jury Mayor Berwick and the officers of Eunice were complimented highly on their efforts to enforce the law.

To the Public: At the next meeting of the town council, the first Tuesday in next month, there will be introduced three ordinances as follows:

One regulating pool rooms, one against gambling in any form and a vagrancy ordinance.

The pool room ordinance will require an all glass front to the building or room in which pool is being played, no screens between the tables and the street, and will set the age limit in boys will be allowed in the pool room. The proprietor will be held responsible for all violations of the law. While Eunice has a law against gambling, we do not consider it up to late, and have asked our City Attorney, Mr. Peyton Sandoz, to give us one air tight.

The vagrancy law will define specifically who is a vagrant, and right here it might be well for me to state that it does not necessarily mean a tramp or some stranger who happen to be in Eunice.

It is intended to reach that class of men who habitually subsisted on the ill gotten gains of prostitutes, by gambling, or his money by other illegal or unfair means, habitual idler and etc.

Any man who habitually works and who happens to be out of a position and is honestly trying to get work will have nothing to fear from this administration.

The law will carry as a penalty a jail sentence and street work.

Any one living in the country and loafing in Eunice, or anyone living in Eunice and living by gambling or other unfair means in the country, will be dealt with just as he pulled off the whole works in Eunice.

We hope there will not be a single arrest under the vagrancy ordinance, and the object of this communication is to give fair warning to all concerned that we are personally acquainted with most of them and know who the law will touch, as well as they do, and will ask that they secure honest employment, or seek more congenial climes.



(Continued from Page 1) The time arrived to elect a commander to fill the vacancy caused by the death of our lamented Major A. Simon. Chairman Ozeme Fontenot placed in nomination the name of J. O. Chachere; Comrade A. Vidrine called the name of F. C. Hollier. Both nominations were seconded. Comrade Hollier withdrew his name and asked that Mr. Chachere be elected by a rising vote. Mr. Chachere was elected unanimously and with a smile and in a few words of acceptance thanked the members for the honor and promised to perform the duties of commander of R. E. Lee Camp No. 14, U. C. V., to the best of his ability. There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

Before adjournment the members were invited to repair to the home of their adjutant and on their arrival the president of Gordon chapter, Mrs. Richard, received the veterans with Creole hospitality and read a statement of funds contributed for the erection of the Confederate monument on the court house square as follows:


