ASKS REMOVAL OF DEPUTY SHERIFFS

EUNICE TOWN COUNCIL ADOPTS RESOLUTION DELARING MEN INCOMPENT FOR JOB.

At a meeting of the Eunice town council held last week there was introduced and passed an ordinance censuring severely two deputy sheriffs in that town and a committee appointed to ask the district judge to revoke their commissions.

The ordinance is as follows: Motion by Adams, duly seconded by Hammers, that Mayor Dudley Berwick make a request of Judge Pavy that he revoke the deputy sheriff's papers of Tansy Fuselier and J. A. Read, for the following reasons:

1st. There are four deputy sheriffs living within the corporate limits of the town of Eunice, including our present town marshal, who obligates himself to attend to all the business of the town. Mr. Tansy Fuselier is at present associated with a concern just without the corporate limits of the town of Eunice in the parish of St. Landry, which by common consent is recognized as a gambling house, and further that Mr. Tansy Fuselier has earned his living for several years by gambling.

Our marshal made a personal appeal to the sheriff's office and was turned down. Both Mr. Read and Mr. Fuselier habitually carry their guns while on the streets of Eunice. Motion carried.
