ported intending to devote considerable attention to the work of sanitation in the Amazon valley and has expressed his intention of affording every governmental protection to investors who help to develop Brazil's natural resources and to encourage desirable colonists. The region comprises an area of 2,000,000 square miles almost five-sixths the extent of all Europe, and its climatic conditions are almost identical with those of Southern Europe.

The only industry which has been developed to any extent up to the present is the production of rubber and this is now in an unsatisfactory condition owing to the competition of the Orient, which has reduced the price of the product below a profitable margin. In consequence, attention is being paid to the other resources of the valley, which include gold, platinum, oil, titanium, vanadium, aluminum, tin, rare cabinet woods, nuts and apparently inexhaustible supplies of cacao, fibers and kapok.

The banks of the Amazon are inundated for three or four months each year and are said to afford splendid opportunities for the cultivation of sugar cane, manioc, rice, maize, beans and other agricultural products. Back of the rivers and behind the forest swais there are vast tracts of savannah suitable for cattle raising. An excessive rainfall at certain seasons of the year, which is followed by a prevalence of fever, is the chief drawback to the climatic conditions and the hospital accommodations in the region are very scanty. The reported intention of the government to tackle this problem in a comprehensive manner is expected to remove one of the principal obstacles to successful colonization.

President Pessoa has frequently spoken of the United States in most enthusiastic and friendly terms since his return home and comment in the newspapers throughout the republic shows that Brazilians are looking to the United States more than to any other country for financial and other aid which they need in the development of their national resources.

STEAMING PAPER

Stripping wall paper from the walls of a room is a tedious and unpleasant task. The following method has been found to do this work satisfactorily: Remove all furniture from the room and take up the floor covering, place in the middle of the room some kind of a portable stove with a big pan of water on top. Light the stove and close all the windows and doors; when the room becomes full of steam it will soften the paste which has been used for sticking the paper on the wall. After an hour or more of the steaming it will be easy to remove the paper.
