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The government has shown that the cost of living has advanced 80 per cent since 1914, this necessarily works a great hardship on those men in the public service whose salaries are fixed by law and who now find it difficult to make both ends meet. This is notoriously true of teachers, college professors and members of the American public health association. The States have made every effort to raise the salary of teachers where the annual appropriations would warrant but in the case of the public health officers salaries have remained at what they were in 1912; considering their quarantine service, their work for the public in improving living conditions, their malaria, typhoid and other health surveys, their drug inspectors and censorship of serums and vaccines; their adjustment of compensation and insurance for invalided and cripple soldiers, their praiseworthy work in army and navy cantonments, it does seem that they have justly earned a salary raise and that Congress should afford them relief.
