BAYOU PLAQUEMINE MALLET DISTRICT VOTES DRAINAGE

ONLY TWO VOTES CAST AGAINST WITH BIG PROPERTY VALUATION IN FAVOR

The property owners of the Plaquemine Mallet Drainage District voted Monday 52 to 2 in favor of the drainage tax.

The election was held at the store of Betrand and Brother in Prairie Ronde.

This is the second time the taxpayers of the district have voted in favor of a tax for drainage. The proposition was carried overwhelmingly about four years ago, but due to some error the sale of the bonds was held illegal and the money could not be obtained. During the mean time the property owners were paying the tax. Some five thousand dollars had been collected. This was refunded to the taxpayers last week.
