### KEEP DISEASE AWAY FROM HEALTHY CATTLE

When introducing additional cattle into a healthy herd great care should be taken to prevent the introduction of diseases and parasites, such as tuberculosis infections, abortions and intestinal worms, says Dr. Harry Morris, bacteriologist and assistant veterinarian, Experiment Station, Louisiana State University. All animals should be placed in quarantine for a certain period of time and certain information obtained from the previous owner if possible. Make inquiry concerning the presence of abortion in the herd; if the herd has not been tested for tuber-

culosis, the tuberculin test should be made at once; if symptoms of worms are present give the worm treatment to the animals; it will do no harm and may prevent the introduction of parasites into a non-infested herd. By following this method of quarantine it is often possible to prevent the introduction of disease into a healthy herd.
