WEEK SET APART FOR SOLDIERS' CAMPAIGN

Three hundred thousand dollars is not a large sum for Louisiana to give for a memorial building to be erected on the Louisiana State University campus to commemorate the death of Louisiana soldiers and sailors. Our sister state on the east, Mississippi, asked for \$500,000. Louisiana should have no difficulty in raising \$300,000.

Practically all the states in the union are erecting memorial buildings to the soldier dead. A cold monument can never symbolize all we would like it to, but a building is a "living" memorial, and may be a physical center through which would flow the vital currents of life and "which, while commemorating those who fell, shall, by service, pay grateful and lasting tribute to all who served." The memorial buildings in the different states include auditorium, hospital, club houses, municipal office buildings, libraries, chapels and churches, school buildings and Y. M. C. A. buildings.

Where the campaign is a state movement, the sum asked for is, in nearly every case, more than \$300,000. Many of the states have also selected the state capital as the best location.

John M. Parker, governor-elect of Louisiana, will head the committee of 25 prominent men of the state that will help direct the state-wide campaign to raise \$300,000 for the erection on the Louisiana State University campus of a useful and handsome building as a memorial to the Louisiana men who died in the service during the World War. Three men from each congressional district will be selected by the executive committee to serve with Governor-elect Parker their names to be announced in the near future.

The movement was first suggested by the David J. Ewing post of the American Legion, whose members were opposed to giving a cash bonus to the ex-service men but advocated the building, by the people of the state, of a lasting memorial to the brave soldiers and sailors who died that the people of this country might continue to enjoy happiness and prosperity. A useful and beautiful building, it was decided, would be far more appropriate than a monument of marble or granite, and the Louisiana State University campus was selected as the best location. Coming generations of Louisiana boys will use this building, and the memory of the brave men who gave their lives will be forever kept alive.

The actual drive for contributions will cover one week, beginning Monday, May 8, and continuing through Saturday, May 15. Campaign headquarters are at Baton Rouge, under the general direction of the executive committee, which is composed of the following men: Raymond Parker, who fought with the Marine in France and is now a member of the house representatives from the parish of Franklin, chairman; Herman Moyses, Baton Rouge, lawyer, who was severely wounded in France and decorated for bravery; L. U. Babin, of Babin & Brown; L. Paul Amis, secretary of the Baton Rouge Chamber of Commerce; and T. H. Harris, superintendent of public education.

Coleman Lindsey, formerly secretary of the Oakdale Chamber of Commerce and widely known as a leader in civic movements, will be the director of the campaign.

The discovery of a new dyestuff in sorghum waste is announced to the French academy of sciences as of much importance. From the husks of sweet sorghum and those of sorghum with black seeds the coloring gum is obtained. It is stated to have many very fine shades of color ranging from pink to bright red, salmon, scarlet, pearl gray, dark gray, dark brown, and khaki. The colors are described as suitable for wool, silk, leather and vegetable fibers and for such materials are pronounced proof against sunlight and washing with soap.
