(Official) SCHOOL BOARD PROCEEDINGS

Opelousas, La., August 2, 1920. The School Board of the parish of St. Landry met in special session at 10 o'clock a. m. on Monday, August 2nd, 1920, pursuant to call, with the following members present: Dr. O. P. Daly, president; Mr. L. L. Perrault, Mr. J. A. Durio, Mr. H. D. Larcade, Jr., Mr. G. Horaist, Dr. L. A. Guidry, Mr. Tilden Meche, Mr. Jos. Benoit, Jr., Mr. R. Lee Hawkins, Mr. A. Fogleman, Mr. Frank Fontenot, Mr. Isaac Stagg, Mr. G. R. Baillio, and Mr. J. W. Lyman. Absent Mr. C. N. Bertrand and Mr. P. W. Lafleur. Quorum present.

Mr. Perrault, in the chair. On motion of Mr. Durio the reading of the minutes of the last meeting were dispensed with and the minutes as published were adopted.

The report of the Finance Committee on the budget of expenditures for the session 1920-21 was then read.

Report of Executive Committee Opelousas, La., July 1st, 1920. To the President and Members of the School Board, Parish of St. Landry, La.

We, your executive committee, respectfully recommend for adoption the following budget of expenditures for the session of 1920-21. Budget of Expenditures Salaries of white teachers, \$155,901.26 Salaries of negro teachers, 16,575.75 Salary of Superintendent of Schools, 3,000.00 Salary of Superintendent of Rural Schools, 2,000.00 Traveling expense of Rural Supervisor, 400.00 Traveling expenses of Superintendent, 400.00 Salaries of janitors, 3,600.00 Members per diem, 800.00 Printing, 750.00 Interest, 1,200.00 Office expense, 500.00 Insurance, 1,600.00 Salaries of Demonstration Agents, 1,800.00 Incidentals, 4,000.00 Operation of transfers, 23,900.00 Salary of office assistant, 960.00 Contingent Fund, 2,300.00 Library Fund, 1,000.00 Total, \$220,687.01

Less operating charges for the month to be charged back to special district, 15,330.01 Net amount of budget, \$205,357.00 Respectfully submitted, O. P. DALY, G. HORAIST, J. A. DURIO, Executive Committee.

Mr. Lyman, duly seconded by Mr. Stagg, moved that the report of the executive committee be received and the budget as reported by this committee be and the same is hereby adopted for the year 1920-21.

Voting yes: Durio, Perrault, Horaist, Guidry, Meche, Benoit, Hawkins, Fontenot, Baillio, Stagg and Lyman. Nays—none. Motion carried. Mr. Daly in the Chair. Mr. Perrault, seconded by Mr. Benoit, moved that the Superintendent be authorized to employ two teachers for the LeBeau colored school for the next session upon condition that the school building owned by the Catholic church at LeBeau be placed under control of the School Board for the next session so that this school may be operated as a public school under the supervision of the parochial school authorities.

Voting in favor of this motion: Mr. Durio, Perrault, Horaist, Guidry, Meche, Benoit, Fogleman, Baillio, Stagg and Lyman. Voting no—Hawkins. Motion carried. Mr. Durio, duly seconded by Mr. Baillio, moved that the bid for the sale of the timber on Section 16 Township 4 S., Range 6 E., East be opened and considered. Carried. Three bids were submitted. On motion of Dr. Guidry, duly seconded by Mr. Lyman, the bids of William N. Barron to purchase the timber on the Sixteenth Section of Township 4, South Range 6 East for \$15,868.00 each be accepted and that W. B. Prescott, Superintendent and Treasurer of this Board be authorized in his behalf to execute the proper deed and to receive the purchase price; said deed to stipulate that the purchaser shall have five years from date of its execution in which to re-

move the timber. Voting for motion: Perrault, Daly, Durio, Larcade, Horaist, Guidry, Meche, Benoit, Fogleman, Hawkins, Baillio, Stagg, Fontenot and Lyman. Nays—none. Motion carried.

Mr. Perrault, duly seconded, moved that all schools of the parish operating for nine months, be opened on Monday, September 6th, 1920, except as otherwise provided, and those schools operating for eight months or less be opened on Monday, October 4th, 1920, and that the schools of the parish be closed for the Holidays on the evening of Thursday, December 23rd, 1920, and reopened on Monday, January 3rd, 1921. Carried.

Mr. Perrault, duly seconded, moved that the Superintendent be authorized to employ Mrs. Florence Wartelle as substitute teacher for a period of nine months, beginning with September 1st, 1920, at a salary of \$60.00 per month. Carried. Dr. Guidry, duly seconded, moved that the superintendent be and he is hereby authorized to enter into contract for the construction of a fence around the property of the Krotz Springs school from the special fund of that district. Carried.

Mr. Benoit, duly seconded, moved that the Superintendent be and he is hereby authorized and directed to issue warrant to the Opelousas Investment Company for the amount of \$3841.90 for printing and furnishing of bonds for the Arnaudville School District. Carried.

Dr. Guidry, duly seconded, moved that the Superintendent be and he is hereby authorized and directed to issue warrant to the Opelousas Investment Company for the amount of \$483.00 for the printing and furnishing of bonds for the Port Barre School District. Carried.

Petition presented to establish transfer route from the Plaquemine-Ridge neighborhood to Lawtell. Dr. Guidry, duly seconded, moved that a transfer route be established from the neighborhood of A. M. Young to operate into the Lawtell school. Carried.

Mr. Durio, duly seconded by Mr. Larcade, moved that the School Board accept payment for timber sold by Mr. Hawkins, a committee appointed by the Board, on Section 16 Township 4 South Range 6 East, being approximately \$284.00 representing the sale of approximately sixty-six thousand feet of timber at \$4.00 per thousand. Carried.

Mr. Benoit, duly seconded, moves that a committee consisting of Perrault, Prescott and Durio be appointed to investigate the lots in the Garland addition and report to the Board at its next meeting, when the Board will take up the question of the sale of these lots separately. Motion carried.

Mr. Perrault, duly seconded by Mr. Benoit, moved that the Superintendent be authorized to purchase a complete Edison-Dick Mimeograph for the office of the School Board and a Mimeoscope. Carried.

Mr. Fogleman, seconded by Mr. Baillio, moved that the bid of the Opelousas Investment Company for the purchase of the twenty-four Thousand Dollar Morrow School District Bonds and the Twenty-five Thousand Dollar Melville School District Bonds be accepted. Voting in favor: Daly, Perrault, Durio, Horaist, Guidry, Meche, Benoit, Hawkins, Fogleman, Fontenot, Baillio, Stagg and Lyman. Nays—none. Motion carried.

Mr. Durio, seconded by Mr. Fogleman, moved that public dances and other entertainments be prohibited in the parishes of the parish of St. Landry except those given under the direction and care of school officials, where the proceeds from such entertainments or dances are to be used solely for the benefit of the school. Carried.

Dr. Guidry, duly seconded, moved that the Superintendent be authorized to allow the salary of the teacher of the Sylvester school for the ninth month of the sessions 1918-19 and 1919-20 to the trustees of said school for the purpose of making repairs to the school. Carried.

Dr. Guidry, duly seconded, moved that the Superintendent be authorized to make the proper return of taxes to Alphonse Antoine and William Chortet paid in error, both being out of district. Carried.

Dr. Guidry, duly seconded, moved that the Superintendent, Mr. Frank Fontenot, Dr. J. B. Guillery, Mr. Rene Fontenot and Mr. Theo. Doucet be appointed a building committee with full power to act in the preparation of plans and the construction of a teachers' home for the Grand Prairie High School and that the Superintendent be directed to charge the construction of said building to the General School Fund. Carried. On motion of Mr. Fogleman, duly seconded the Board adjourned. O. P. DALY, President. W. B. PRESCOTT, Secretary.
