A WOMAN'S PLEA FOR A COMMUNITY NURSE

How many of your bright faced children have incipient diseases or defective teeth, eyes, ears, tonsils or lungs. How many have adenoids? How many of the babies being born into your community are receiving proper pre-natal and post-natal care—care that will help give them sound bodies and nerves. How many of your sick or disabled are really suffering because they do not know how to follow up their doctor's advice or how to take care of their wounds. Who is looking after the babies who are underfed and the poor who are in distress but too proud to ask help.

If you fell sick and no private nurse were available is there any one in your town who would drop in to give you trained care. Here is where the COMMUNITY NURSE COMES AND SHE WILL HELP.

To us is credited the assertion that we want to be equal to men. It isn't true; Never once have we doubted our equality. MOTHER GOUGH DIES IN GRAND COTEAU JULY 31

END OF A LONG AND PEACEFUL LIFE OF RELIGIOUS LABOR COMES AT 81

Grand Coteau, La., Aug. 4.—Mother Theresa Gough died Saturday, July 31st at the Convent of the Sacred Heart at the age of 81 years.

Mother Gough, whose name is very familiar to the numerous friends of the institution, was born in Albany, N. Y. eighty-one years ago. In 1850 her family removed to Cincinnati and later to New Orleans. In 1868 Miss Gough entered the Society of the Sacred Heart of Jesus at St. Michael's Convent in St. James Parish. She took her vows in Natchitoches which then possessed a house of the society, and in 1876 was professed at the Mother-House in Paris.

All through her religious life Mother Gough devoted herself to the work of education in the different houses of the Southland: in St. Michael's Natchitoches, New Orleans, and in Selma, Ala. But it is especially at Grand Coteau, La., that the devoted mother gave full scope to her zeal when in 1889 she was called upon by her superior to organize the Parochial school. To that important task she gave herself instinctively with characteristic energy and earnestness. Laboring with success in that part of the Lord's Vineyard for twenty-four years; securing during that long span the deserved esteem, appreciation and affection of an ever widening circle of friends. Seven years ago on account of advancing age, Mother Gough was called upon to make the sacrifice of work she dearly loved. Since then she has been preparing to answer the last call of the Master she had ever served most faithfully. That supreme summons came Saturday at 9 p. m. The funeral services took place in the Convent chapel Sunday, August 1st.

A large concourse of sympathetic and grateful friends and former pupils accompanied the remains to their last resting place in the peaceful convent cemetery. Rev. James A. Charnard, S. J., Convent chaplain officiated assisted by Rev. Joseph B. Frankhauser, S. J., pastor of the Sacred Heart Church.


