DRIED PRODUCTS USED IN DEMONSTRATIONS

To stimulate interest in and to advocate the wider practice of the drying of products, Miss Norma Overby, state home demonstration agent, Extension Division, Louisiana State University, has sent 120 cases of dried carrots, spinach, string beans, and apples to the 30 parish home demonstration agents. These products were dried in California and Florida and were sent to Miss Overby by the Washington authorities for distribution.

The agents will use these products in their public demonstrations in their parishes. They will prepare attractive dishes from them and in this way call attention to the fact that both the flavor and quality of a product are maintained in this process of preserving foods. They will also emphasize the fact that more attention should be directed to this process because in the drying of products less container space is required.

Notice To Vehicle Owners

The Vehicle Tax, which applies to Automobiles, Wagons, Buggies, Log Wagons, etc., is long past due and the law governing same will be rigidly enforced on and after September 1.

Under a resolution of the police jury I have been authorized to and have appointed deputies in every ward in the parish whose duty it will be to see that no one avoids payment of the vehicle tax.

The penalty for failure to pay this tax is a fine of \$10.00 and costs of court.

The amount of the tax as it applies to different vehicles for the year 1920 is as follows:

Automobiles, 25 cents per horse power, Log Wagons, \$3.00, Wagons, \$1.00, Buggies, Carriages, etc. 75c, Tractors, \$10.00.

Vehicle owners are requested to attend to this and avoid punishment.
