GREAT PLANS TO DEVELOP ALASKA

SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR PAYNE'S INSPECTION TRIP WILL HAVE RESULTS

CHANCES FOR NEW CAPITAL Exploitation by Selfish Interests Will Not Be Permitted, But Development of Territory's Huge Resources Will Be Fostered

Washington.—John Barton Payne, secretary of the department of the interior has returned to Washington from an inspection tour of Alaska with Josephus Daniels, secretary of the navy. The trip was made from Seattle to Alaska on a United States destroyer and the object was to get information at first hand as to what steps should be taken by the government toward facilitating the development of the "last frontier" of the United States.

Before Secretary Payne started on the trip he had plans under way for the greater development of Alaskan resources. He had a special committee at work for some time preparing recommendations, which the secretary has now approved. The plans include co-operation of commercial organizations interested in the territory and the development of its resources.

"Alaska has immense natural resources which have never been developed properly," said Secretary Payne. "During the war the white population of the territory actually decreased from 50,000 in 1915, to 36,000 at present, and the output of mineral and other industries showed a similar decrease. The rich mining agricultural and fishing reserves of the region have never been made properly available. Under the policies which the department is now putting into effect an opportunity will be given for the investment of new capital."

No Selfish Exploitation

Secretary Payne makes it plain, however, that the resources of this great wonderland of the north will not be permitted to be exploited by selfish interests.

"Exploitation of the resources of the territory will not be turned over to one interest or group of interests," he says. "Improvement of shipping and railroad facilities is undertaken with the purpose of admitting fresh capital and opening the country for settlement by American citizens. The first step in this direction is the lowering of freight rates and passenger fares and the improvement of transportation and mail service through economies introduced by combination of the two existing steamship lines into one, which the department hopes to effect."

The two steamship lines referred to are the Pacific Steamship company and the Alaska Steamship company. Conferences have been arranged by the secretary for the purpose of getting the companies together. It is understood that the plan is not opposed by the companies, if a plan for consolidation can be worked out. "Concentration and co-ordination of federal control of Alaska lands and resources is contemplated by obtaining legislative authority for an Alaska development board, and pending this, by the appointment of an inter-departmental Alaska committee," says the secretary.

Roads Copper and Timber "Other plans include the co-ordination of federal road construction and the development of a plan for a comprehensive system of roads and trails to serve the entire territory, and also the requesting of an appropriation of at least one million dollars for the inauguration of this system."

"Investigation of the feasibility of smelting Alaska copper ores on a commercial basis within the territory will be undertaken. Of great importance also is the immediate development of an Alaska pulp-wood industry, and additional surveys of timber and water power looking to the largest possible development of this industry."

The committee which submitted the recommendations which the secretary has approved was composed by Dr. Alfred H. Brooks, chairman, representing the department of the interior; H. Y. Saint, representing the United States shipping board; Otto Praeger, second assistant postmaster general, and E. A. Sherman, representing the department of agriculture. The committee made an extensive investigation, holding hearings at Seattle.

Alaska's mineral, fish, fur and other products, produced since 1867 are estimated at approximately one billion dollar. The most prosperous year was in 1916 when the total output was \$89,000,000.

Extensive areas of farm lands suitable for raising the hardier grains including wheat, potatoes, forage crops and many varieties of vegetables, are found in Alaska, notwithstanding the popular impression that it is a land of perpetual snow and ice. The timber resources include about 75,000,000 acres of forest.

WARSHIPS TO PREVENT LANDING OF CABLE

Washington.—Five destroyers are patrolling the entrance to the Miami (Fla.) harbor, under orders from President Wilson to prevent, by force if necessary, the landing of a cable the Western Union Telegraph Company is having laid from Barbados, a British possession in the West Indies. A British cable ship, the Colonial, has been chartered by the Western Union Company to land the American end of the cable, which would connect with a British cable line from Barbados to South America. At the state department it was stated today that the British embassy had been asked to inform the master of the ship that such a landing would be in violation of American law. Officials explained there was no significance in the fact that the vessel was British; that she probably was the only craft available to the American company when she was chartered.

Work on the cable line from Barbados was begun last summer. Some time ago the Western Union Company applied to the state department for an executive permit to land the wire at Miami, but officials said action on it had been delayed pending the holding of the International Communications Congress, called to meet in Washington September 15.

FINAL WARNINGS IS GIVEN TO SLACKERS

DOUBTFUL DRAFT REGISTRANTS URGED TO WRITE THE ADJUTANT GENERAL

Washington.—The war department, in a final effort to square accounts with the 173,911 men now listed on the books as draft deserters, Monday offered a last chance to any of those men whose names are enrolled there by error to put themselves right.

Any draft registrant who is in doubt as to his status is enjoined by the department to write at once to the adjutant general of the army at Washington and find out how he is classified. He is urged to do so within the next two weeks, or as to allow sufficient time for his case to be passed on before public announcement of the names of the deserters is made. Each man classified as a draft deserter has had his name posted in the community in which he is registered as being required to perform certain duties and efforts have been made to notify him at the address given by him.

In its announcement, the war department lays stress on its anxiety "not to place upon any man who served his country honorably the humiliation of having his name appear as a slacker, and says for that reason it is advertising as widely as possible the fact that the list of deserters will soon be published and that the men whose names appear on it will be arrested and tried before military courts. It therefore urges every man who is not positive that his record with the local draft board was complete in every detail to clear his record, adding:

"Once the list of deserters is posted every means at the disposal of the army, will be brought into play to bring about the arrest and trial of the guilty."

"The tremendous public sentiment against slackers," the announcement concludes, "will cause the whereabouts of most of them to be revealed and it is not expected that any guilty man will escape."

LARGEST DEAF MUTE COLONY REPRESENTED IN DETROIT

The largest deaf mute colony in the United States, is located at Akron, O., was represented at the annual convention of the national association of deaf, held August 9-14 in Detroit, by a delegation of 200.

Approximately 5,000 "silents" attend the convention from all parts of the country.

The entire Akron delegation was composed of workers in the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company, which has gathered deaf mutes from all parts of the country.

Eastern delegates will stop at Akron enroute to the convention and will be entertained by the Goodyear Silent colony of about 1,000 deaf mute.

Akron, Ohio, will be well represented at the second annual state convention of Ohio's American legion to be held at Youngstown August 25-27 by the largest delegation from Summit County. Twelve delegates and as many alternates will be in attendance, as well as more than 100 members of Akron Post 209, composed mostly of employees of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company.

Akron Post is also making arrangements to be strongly represented at the national convention to be held at Cleveland in September.

OVERALL PARADE RESULTS IN FREE FOR ALL FIGHT

Essen, Germany, Aug. 14.—Moved by the American example a number of young men here made an attempt to fight high tailoring prices by organizing a procession clad in blue overalls. Their effort, however, aroused the ire of the working population who, under the impression that it was "a studied insult to their class," made a rush for the paraders. A free fight ensued and some of the cheap tailoring propagandists were badly injured.
