Alderman Stelly offered the following resolution:

Amending a resolution heretofore adopted on the 21st day of August, 1920, providing for the issuance of \$250,000 public improvement bonds of the City of Opelousas, Louisiana, by changing the form of said bonds, adopting a new schedule of maturities for said bonds, and adopting a new form of endorsement thereon.

Whereas, a resolution was heretofore adopted by the mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Opelousas, Louisiana, on the 21st day of August, 1920, providing for the issuance of \$250,000 Public Improvement Bonds of said City, authorized at an election held on the 8th day of June, 1920; and

Whereas, it is desired to amend said resolution, and the form of bond therein adopted, by changing the statement of the purpose of the issuance of said bonds, by adopting a new schedule of maturities for said bonds, and by adopting a new form of endorsement to be signed by the Secretary of State.

Section 1. Now, therefore, be it resolved, by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Opelousas, Louisiana, that the maturities heretofore prescribed by a resolution adopted on the 21st day of August, 1920, providing for the issuance of \$250,000 Public Improvement Bonds of the City of Opelousas, La., authorized by an election held on the 8th day of June, 1920, be and the same are hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 2. Be it further resolved, that the form of bond heretofore adopted by said resolution of the 21st day of August, 1920, be amended so as to read as follows:

UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, STATE OF LOUISIANA, Parish of St. Landry.

CITY OF OPELOUSAS, LA., PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS BONDS No. 1 \$500.00

Know all men by these presents, That the City of Opelousas, St. Landry parish, Louisiana, for value received, is indebted to and hereby promises to pay to bearer the sum of \$500.00 on the 1st day of July, 19--, with interest thereon from the date hereof at the rate of five per centum per annum, payable semi-annually on the 1st day of January and July in each and every year, on presentation and surrender of the proper coupons hereto attached, bearing a facsimile of the signature of the clerk of the board of aldermen of said city, as they severally become due. Both principal and interest of these bonds are payable in gold coin of the United States of America, of the present standard of weight and fineness, at the Chase National Bank, in the City of New York, State of New York, and the said City of Opelousas, St. Landry parish, La., is hereby held and firmly bound, and its faith, credit, revenue and property are hereby pledged for the payment of the principal and interest hereof at maturity.

This bond is one of the issue of 500 bonds of like date, tenor, and effect, except as to time of maturity, issued by the mayor and board of aldermen, as the governing authority of said municipality, for the purpose of purchasing and constructing water-works and light systems for said city, and paving and improving the streets of said city, under authority of Section 1. of Article 281 of the Constitution of Louisiana, and Act 256 of the year 1910, as amended, and a resolution duly and regularly adopted by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Opelousas, St. Landry parish, La., on the 21st day of August, A. D. 1920.

It is hereby certified, recited and declared that the proposition to issue said bonds and incur said debt was voted for by the majority in number and amount of the property taxpayers, qualified as electors under the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana, voting at an election duly and regularly held for the purpose, on the 8th day of June, A. D. 1920; that provisions have been made for

the levying of an ad valorem tax to pay said bonds; that all acts, conditions and things required to be done precedent to and in the issuing of said bonds have been properly and legally done, have happened, and have been performed in regular and due form as required by law, and the said indebtedness does not exceed any statutory or constitutional limitation. In testimony whereof, we, the undersigned Mayor and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, of the City of Opelousas, St. Landry parish, La., being duly authorized to execute this obligation on behalf of said city, have hereto signed our names officially, and affixed hereto the corporate seal of said municipality, at the City of Opelousas, St. Landry parish, La., as of the 1st day of the month of July, A. D. 1920.

Mayor, Clerk, (Interest Coupon) No. 1 \$12.50

On January 1, 1921, the City of Opelousas, St. Landry parish, La., will pay to bearer \$12.50, gold coin of the United States of America, of the present standard of weight and fineness, on presentation and surrender of this coupon at the Chase National Bank, in the City of New York, State of New York, being six (6) months interest then due on its Public Improvement Bond, dated July 1, 1920.

On the back of said bonds shall be printed the following endorsement: "This bond secured by a tax, registered on this, day of 1920."

Secretary of State. Section 3. Be it further resolved, because of the desirability of immediately preparing and disposing of the aforesaid bonds, that this resolution shall take effect immediately.

The above and foregoing resolution having been read in full in open session and having been duly considered section by section, was adopted as a whole by the following vote: Yeas: Muret, Dejean, Danel, Stelly and Clark. during that time the loan bank has been unable to continue its business. As a natural consequence, the local farm loan associations scattered throughout the nation have been restrained from making loans to farmers applying for them and they have had to wait with patience until the matter was finally decided.

The local loan association, according to its attorney, Morton H. Thompson, has applications for loans pending that would total a large sum of money. The association before the injunction proceedings were started, was doing a splendid business and had loaned many thousands of dollars to farmers in this parish who had become members, as the taking of stock in the association and thereby becoming a member was a necessary prerequisite to the obtaining of a loan. So successful has been the local body that applications for memberships and loans came in a veritable flood. These applications now pending must await until the court finally passes on the act creating the loan bank, and this decision, expected Monday, will hardly be handed down before the next decision day.

FARM LOAN BANK HANDS ARE TIED BY INJUNCTION

Applications for Loans Await Decision of Supreme Court

BIG CORPORATIONS BEGAN PROCEEDINGS

Local Body Has Flood of Applications and Could Lend Millions

News was awaited Monday of a decision of the United States supreme court in the injunction proceedings restraining the farm loan bank from lending money on farm mortgages, but the expected decision failed to materialize notwithstanding the fact that arguments of counsel on the injunction were had some time ago.

Big money lending companies started the proceedings against the farm loan bank on the grounds that the government was interfering with private affairs and going beyond the ordinary function of government in entering the money lending field. Acting on this line, these companies secured an injunction restraining the farm loan bank, a government institution, from doing further business until the constitutionality of the act of congress creating the bank had been passed upon by the supreme court of the United States.

In due course the case came up for hearing before the high court and attorneys representing the private corporations and the government were heard by the judicial tribunal at Washington. This injunction has been in effect for some months, and

MACHINE MAKES HOLES IN ROQUEFORT CHEESE

The venerable vaudeville gag about the workman who bores the holes in Swiss cheese was probably originated by a jokesmith who did not know that the American imitation Roquefort cheese actually receives this treatment. And now a machine has been developed for this work, says the Popular Mechanics Magazine for October in an illustrated article, it consists, fundamentally, of a large number of vertical needles which are pushed down through the cheese as a hand lever is depressed. The purpose of making these holes is to quicken the growth of the mold, or fungus, which gives the substance its familiar flavor and appearance.

LOCK STOPS THEFT OF SHOES FROM HOTEL CORRIDORS

The soaring price of leather gives timely interest to a locking apparatus, described and illustrated in the October Popular Mechanics Magazine, which makes impossible the theft of shoes when, as is the custom in Europe, the hotel guest leaves them outside his door on retiring for the night. Fixed to the mop board near the door, the apparatus consists of two vertical rods which can be pushed down against the insoles of the shoes. From this position the rods can be raised, to permit the removal of the shoes, only after they have been unlocked by the master key in the hands of the "shine boy" or the room key in the possession of the guest.
