Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Opelousas, La., that Section two (2) of an ordinance of the City of Opelousas, La., adopted December 9, 1909, entitled "An ordinance fixing the limits within the town of Opelousas, in which horses, mules, horned cattle, hogs, goats and sheep are prohibited from running at large, and prescribing penalties for the violation hereof," be and the same is hereby amended and at large, and prescribing penalties re-enacted so as to read as follows: Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc. That if such stock found running at large, shall be taken up by this ordinance, shall be taken up by any police officer of the city the owner of the same shall be fined in the sum of two (\$2.00) dollars for the first offense under this ordinance, and for each subsequent offense the sum of three (\$3.00) dollars, to be paid into the city treasury for each head of horses, mules or horned cattle taken up by such officers; and one dollar for each head of hogs, goats or sheep so taken up by such officers, with an additional charge of fifty cents per head per day for taking care of such horses, mules or horned cattle so taken up, and twenty-five cents per head per day for taking care of or feeding such hogs, goats or sheep so taken up.

The high voltage wires throughout the city are in an extremely dangerous condition and are apt to drop at any time. With one of these wires down any other wire is a source of potential danger. KEEP AWAY FROM ALL WIRES—NO MATTER OF WHAT KIND! There is an especially dangerous condition existing near the High School, and parents should warn their children not to play under any wires. These conditions will be remedied at the earliest possible moment, but right now they are UNSAFE.
