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HOME AGENTS REPORT
MANY ACTIVITIES

Newly organized agricultural clubs in Cadwell parish are making a good showing according to Miss Zilia Shows, home demonstration agent, who reports she has ordered thirty-five settings of purebred eggs this week for one of her new clubs. Miss Shows says that she believes her new clubs will be close rivals to her older ones organized last year. A carload of mixed poultry will be shipped from Caldwell soon. This plan was devised as a means of getting rid of the mixed breeds of poultry. Through the influence of the agent arrangements have been made whereby the banks are going to lend the farmers of this parish money to place purebred poultry on their farms.

Poultry club members in Natchitoches parish have placed from 100 to 150 eggs in the mammoth incubator at the normal for incubation, reports Mrs. W. C. Pierson, home demonstration agent. The manager of the incubator made a special price for the club members. The agent has placed an exhibit of canned goods in one of the leading show windows and she has received orders for beans, chowchow, jelly and preserves.

Buying bee hives and crating them was the major work done this week in Madison parish by Miss Rebecca Whitaker, home demonstration agent. These hives were purchased for demonstrators who secured their standard live material last year too late to get bees at that time. Miss Whitaker says there is a marked increase in interest in the bee culture. She enrolled two more demonstrators this week.

Club children in Allen parish have gotten the idea that purebred stock is the only kind to have, according to Mrs. Eleanor Tyree, home demonstration agent. One of her club members sold six spring chickens this week and she says that club work is booming there.

Mrs. Cornealia Staples, home agent in Lincoln parish, says that the auction sales no the first Wednesday in each month are always successful. She recently displayed garden seeds, the steam pressure canner, preserved eggs and a model dress form which, she says, caused many people to come to her for seed and to inquire about the canner. Mrs. Staples sold last week nine dozen cans of tomatoes for one of her club girls for \$1.25 a dozen. "Louisiana Club Leaders" were distributed throughout Natchitoches parish this week by Mrs. W. C. Pierson home agent. Mrs. Pierson says that she doesn't know of anything that affords members more pleasure than club paper that is issued each month. Natchitoches parish is taking a lively interest in the poultry drive and it looks as if this parish will soon be ranking high in the purebred poultry business, she says.

Taking women with you on trips throughout the parish in order to give them object lessons is not a bad plan, believes Mrs. Martha Crouse, home agent in Washington parish. she says that she took a lukewarm poultry demonstrator on a trip with her and the woman came back thoroughly convinced that poultry would pay, so she went home and ordered some baby chicks and got to work. The latest report from her stated that she had built model poultry houses and had ordered an incubator.

Leona Campbell, a poultry club member from Ouachita parish, has a new poultry yard. She has built some model houses from plans furnished her by Mrs. Jewell McQuillier, home agent, and she has set out to win the \$5 gold piece that is being offered for the best Barred Plymouth Rock chicken raised in the parish this year. One of the Ouachita club girls has saved \$10 towards paying her way to the summer short course at Baton Rouge.

PLANT BUTTER BEANS
FOR FOOD AND SHADE

There are two common types of butter beans, the bush and the pole. The Henderson bush lima, as its name implies, is the bush type. It is earlier than the Carolina Lima, our standard pole sort, and does not bear so long. For conditions bearing over a long period, plant the Carolina (pole) Lima. Both of the varieties mentioned belong to the small lima class. Do not plant the large limas here.

Butter bean require a rich, well drained, mellow soil. If the garden is not well enriched, well-rotted stable manure should be used. They

should not be planted until danger of frost is past and the ground is well warmed. In this latitude (Baton Rouge) soil and weather conditions are generally favorable for early plantings about the middle of April. However, this season one can probably plant much earlier as the weather is much warmer than usual. As the butter beans are warm loving plants, later plantings may be made with success, even in June and an abundance of pods be produced till frost kills the vines. The butter beans are especially adapted to back-yard gardens as they can be planted along the edges of the yard and allowed to climb on the fences. They should also be considered when planting to shade galleries, remembering that they are ready to serve a useful as well as ornamental purpose. When planting under usual conditions (in the open garden) 6 to 8 beans are usually dropped to the hill and covered just deep enough to assure good germination. One-half to one inch should suffice ordinarily if the soil is quite moist. When the plants are well established thin to three or four to the hill. On average soils the hills are spaced about three feet apart on low ridges (beds) four feet wide. One pint of seed should plant about 100 hills.

JERSEY COW BREAKS
LOUISIANA RECORDS

The highest official record that has ever been made by a dairy cow in Louisiana was that of Golden Bar's Foxy Lass 367782, a Jersey cow owned by Dr. A. J. Price, of Thibodaux, when she produced in one year 12,955.3 pounds (1,506.64 gallons) of milk and 686.55 pounds of butterfat, which is equivalent to 807.8 pounds of 85 per cent butter. Had this cow produced 700 pounds of butterfat she would have been presented with a gold medal by the American Jersey Cattle Club. This cow was only four years and six months old when she started her test and she was not pushed for a high record. The specialists from the dairy division say that they are confident that she will make a much better record during her next year's work.

Golden Bar's Foxy Lass is not the only good cow in Dr. Price's herd. He has twenty-five cows on official test. Among them are Gussie's Foxy May with a record of 639.96 pounds of butterfat, and Gussie's Dame Virginia which holds the state record for a three year old cow with 452.29 pounds of butterfat.

"The records made by these cows should create new interest and enthusiasm among the dairy farmers of the state," says C. H. Staples of the state university dairy division. These records should encourage the dairymen to give more thought to the feeding and caring of their cows and the elim-

inating of the poor ones keeping records of the feed the dairy cows consume and the milk and butterfat they produce."

Ordinance Creating The Lawtell Drainage District
Mr. W. C. Dejean, offered the following ordinance which was duly seconded by Mr. Elieo Guillory.

AN ORDINANCE
Of the police jury of the parish of St. Landry, State of Louisiana creating the "Lawtell Drainage District" of the said parish of St. Landry, State of Louisiana, and fixing the boundaries thereof, constituting said drainage district, a body corporate in law, and vesting it with power and authority incident thereto; vesting the government and control of said drainage district in a board of five (5) commissioners, and fixing their term of office.

Section 1. Now, therefore, be it ordained by the police jury of the said parish of St. Landry, state of Louisiana, now in regular session duly assembled, that all of the land and property situated within the following described boundaries, to-wit:

Beginning at a point at the Southwest corner of the Se 1-4 of SE 1-4 of Section 34, Township Six (6) South, Range Two (2) East, being a point where the boundary line of the Bayou Plaquemine Drainage District intersects the parish line between the Parishes of Acadia and St. Landry; thence running North one-quarter mile; thence East and Northeast along the boundary of the said Bayou Plaquemine Drainage District, to where same intersects the South boundary of the Bayou Mallet and Plaquemine Drainage District; thence West and Northwest along said boundary line to where the same intersects the boundary line between the parishes of St. Landry and Evangeline; thence South, South and West, along said parish line to where the same intersects the South line of Sec. or Grant No. 7, Tp. 6, S. 2, E.; thence Southwest, along said Section or Grant line, to the West line of Section 17, T. 6, S. 2, E.; thence South to the North line of Section 48, T. 6, S. 2, E.; thence following the North and West lines of said Section 48 to where the same intersects the West Line of Section 25, T. 6, S. 2, E.; thence South to a point one-quarter of a mile South of the North line of Section 31, T. 6, S. 2, E.; thence East to Bayou Mallet and thence crossing said Bayou to a line of division between property of Frank Brinkman and properties of Ernest Guillory and Arthur Miller; thence in a Southeastly direction, along said division line to where the same intersects the division line between the parishes of St. Landry and Acadia; thence East along said division line to point of beginning. Containing approximately Sixteen Thousand (16,000) acres of land, be and the same is hereby incorporated into a Drainage District to be designated and known as the "Lawtell Drainage District" of the parish of St. Landry, state of Louisiana, and all the land and property situated within the boundaries of said drainage district shall be subject to taxation for the purpose of more perfectly draining the lands of rain water within said drainage district.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that the said Lawtell Drainage District be and the same is hereby duly constituted and declared to be a body corporate in law. It shall have perpetual existence and shall enjoy and exercise all rights, powers and privileges as now granted, or which may hereafter be granted by the constitution and laws of the state of Louisiana, to corporations of this character with full authority and power to contract, sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, appear, answer and prosecute in all courts of justice and elsewhere, to make and use a corporate seal which shall be a circle of the words: "LAWTELL DRAINAGE DISTRICT," and in the center: "Corporate Seal 1921, La." The domicile of said corporation shall be in the town of Lawtell, in the parish of St. Landry, state of Louisiana. All citations or other legal process shall be served upon the president, and in his absence upon the vice-president, and in his absence upon the secretary. It shall keep at its domicile all its official books and records.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that said corporation shall have authority to receive by donation or to buy or expropriate property when deemed necessary to use such property in carrying out the plans and purposes for which said drainage district was created. It shall have authority to purchase or rent machinery which may be necessary for draining the land within said drainage district and to have the work executed under its own supervision, and shall own the right-of-way for canals and ditches and all sites which are acquired for the said drainage district. It is hereby vested with full power and authority, and it shall be its duty to open, straighten and clean up all natural drains, or make new ditches or canals, which it may deem necessary or proper, and to perform any and all other work incidental to or connected therewith which may be needful to render the natural drains of said drainage district more perfect and effective. It shall have the power and authority to cut and open new drains or canals. The drainage commissioners for the purpose of securing a proper outlet for the water of the said drainage district shall have full power and authority to extend drainage ditches or canals beyond the boundaries of the said drainage district with the same power and authority to expropriate the right of way in the same manner and to the same extent as though such ditches or canals were situated within the boundaries of the said district. They shall have authority to make and execute, contracts and to do and perform any and all acts necessary to carry out the plans and purpose for which the said district was created, namely: to design, construct, and maintain a comprehensive system of gravity drains within its boundaries. They shall have authority to divide the district into one or more sub-drainage districts as conferred upon them by Act No. 227 of the Acts of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana of 1914, as amended.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., that all the corporate powers and the administration of the affairs of the said drainage district shall be vested in and controlled by a board of commissioners to be known as the "The Board of Drainage Commissioners of the Lawtell Drainage District," and said board of commissioners shall be composed of five members, who, or whose wives shall own real estate situated within the boundaries of said drainage district assessed for not less than five hundred dollars (\$500.00), or must be the representatives of some corporation owning real estate within the said drainage district assessed for not less than five hundred dollars (\$500.00). Persons possessing such qualifications may be appointed drainage commissioners whether they be residents or non-residents of said drainage district, but must be residents of this state. The police jury shall appoint three commissioners, one for a term of four years and two for a term of two years each. The remaining two commissioners shall be appointed by the government of the state to serve for four years each, and all appointments of commissioners by the said police jury thereafter shall be for a term of four years each. The appointment of the commissioners by the police jury shall be made upon a written petition signed by not less than twenty-five land owners of said drainage district.

All vacancies on said board caused by death resignation or otherwise, shall be filled in the same manner in which the commissioners thereof were originally appointed and for the unexpired term only.

Section 5. Be it further ordained, etc., that the commissioners appointed under the provisions of Section Four of the ordinance, after having qualified according to law, shall convene and hold their first meeting in the town of Lawtell on the 31st day of March, 1921, at Ten O'clock, a. m., and shall then and there proceed to organize by the election of officers as follows:

First: They shall elect from their number a president and vice-president. The president shall perform the duties as are usually required of presidents of corporate bodies of this character. The vice-president shall act in the absence of the president or during the time of his inability to act.

Second: They shall elect a secretary and treasurer who may or may not be a member of the board of commissioners. The secretary and treasurer shall receive a salary not exceeding twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) per month and shall perform all duties required by him or them by the board of commissioners.

Section 6. Be it further ordained, etc., that the board of commissioners shall meet as often as they deem it necessary to properly conduct the affairs of the district, provided that at least one meeting shall be held every year. All of the expenses of administering the affairs of said drainage district, including salaries of officers, etc., shall be paid out of any funds in the hands of the treasurer belonging to the said district when such items,

ills, salaries, or other expenses shall have been approved at a meeting of the board of commissioners, provided that the commissioners themselves shall not receive any compensation for their services as members of said drainage board, but may be reimbursed for any expenses incurred in performing the duties imposed upon them by virtue of their appointments.

Section 7. Be it further ordained, etc., that the said board of commissioners may make and adopt by-laws, rules and regulations for its government and that of its officers and employees.

Section 8. Be it further ordained, etc., that in order to carry into effect the provisions contained in this ordinance relative to the drainage of the land situated within the boundaries of said drainage district, the said board of commissioners are hereby fully authorized, empowered and directed to provide the funds necessary therefor by levying and collecting in the manner provided by law, any tax or forced contribution which is now or may hereafter be authorized by the constitution and laws of this state and to incur debts and issue negotiable bonds as authorized by Act No. 256 of 1910 of the general assembly of the state of Louisiana, as well as any and all amendments that may now exist or may hereafter be made thereto.

Section 9. Be it further ordained, etc., that said drainage district shall have and possess all the rights, powers, privileges and immunities that are now conferred upon it by the constitution and laws as well as any and all laws or parts of laws or amendments thereto, that may now exist or may hereafter be enacted by the general assembly of the state of Louisiana.

Section 10. Be it further ordained, etc., that this ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its adoption, and publication.

POTATO BEETLE MAKES

EARLY APPEARANCE

The Colorado potato beetle is on the job early this season as many inquiries regarding the control of this insect have been received by the horticulturists in the state university extension division. Adults that have hibernated over winter are beginning to appear and egg laying is well under way. Gardeners with small areas of Irish potatoes should hand pick and destroy these "early comers," and should crush all eggs that may be seen, say the specialists. The eggs are orange colored and are found in masses on the under surface of the leaves. From these eggs issue the large larvae or slugs that play great havoc by devouring the foliage. Watch for these slugs and hand pick again.

"Where the area is to great to hand pick effectively, the slugs should be poisoned with powdered arsenate of lead," the specialists say. "This poison may be applied in various ways. The simplest way perhaps, for small areas is dusting the foliage with a cheesecloth sack. When the cheesecloth is used, the powdered arsenate of lead should be mixed thoroughly with at least an equal part by measure of dry slaked lime."

"If further details or other methods of application are desired, write to the horticultural department, Louisiana State University, Baton Rouge, for circular No. H-44."
