

The following ordinance was read: ORDINANCE NUMBER 83

An ordinance authorizing the mayor of Melville, La., to contract a loan of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) from the Merchants and Farmers Bank of Melville, La., for the purpose of paying salaries, and other general expenses; and providing for payments of same by anticipating the excess of the town's revenues over and above the necessary usual and statutory charges.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the mayor and board of aldermen of the town of Melville, La., that in view of the pressing necessity for sufficient funds to pay salaries and other necessary expenses until the 1921 taxes become due and are sufficiently paid to the said municipality that the mayor be and he is hereby authorized and empowered to borrow from the Merchants and Farmers Bank of Melville, La., the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) and to represent which he is further authorized to execute by and on behalf of the town of Melville a promissory note in favor of the said bank payable eight (8) months after date, bearing eight (8) per cent interest per annum until paid and to contain other usual clauses.

Be it further ordained, etc., that in order to secure the payment of said promissory note in principal and interest and attorney's fees is hereby dedicated and set aside all of the excess revenues of the municipality of Melville, La., over and above the usual and statutory charges of the said municipality such excess being as per anticipated revenues for 1921, and which is hereby fixed as the basis and anticipation and dedication the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00).

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that for good and sufficient cause this ordinance shall take effect immediately after its passage.

On call of the roll the following vote was taken: Yeas: Gus. Rosenberg, R. H. Jones, Peter Glaser, Nays: None. Absent: W. J. Bergeron.

This done and passed in regular session convened on the 3rd day of May, A. D. 1921.

Experts to Build Ideal Section

The Lincoln highway association has announced the names of the experts retained to collaborate in the final detailed design of the ideal section which is soon to be built on the Lincoln highway, the funds being provided by the United States Rubber company.

The letting of the contract for the construction of the ideal section has been placed in the hands of Lockwood Greene & company, engineers, of Boston, Mass.

In charge of the final detailed design of the ideal section, will be W. G. Thompson, late state highway engineer of New Jersey, and formerly associated with General Goethals in the construction of the Panama canal.

That the beautification of the ideal section may be of the same high standard as the construction work on the road itself, Jens Jenson of Chicago, who is known as one of America's leading landscape architects, has been engaged.

Plans Large Hog Farm

Columbia, La., May 16—With the assistance of J. B. Francioni, swine specialist in the extension division, H. V. Harris, agent in Caldwell parish, planned the buildings, rotations, and fencing for a hog farm for two Monroe physicians, who will raise purebred hogs and have a real hog farm.

Automobile Tires are Getting Better

One of the noteworthy features regarding the manufacture of automobile tires in this country is the fact that during the last five years tires have improved in quality that the average number of tires used on an automobile during a year has dropped from five to considerably under four.

This drop has come, too, in the face of an increase in winter driving so large as to be a vital element in the calculation. Many cars now operate twelve months in the year but in spite of this increased period of service, the average annual consumption of tires per car has steadily fallen.

With the return to normal times and with money less plentiful, car owners are certain to watch their expense bills more closely. The exercise of only a moderate degree of care by the car owners will lift the average mileage secured from tires to a point many thousands of miles above any hitherto reached.

So far known the best record ever made on a set of four tires was that of a Boston merchant who got 39,152 miles on a set of United States Royal cords. He attributed this phenomenal record to the care given to the tires by his chauffeur.
