purpose of completing said system of drainage in said District; and Whereas, the aforesaid forced contribution or acreage tax of twelve cents per acre per annum, running for a period of sixteen years and levied upon each of the 19,412 acres of land in said District will produce a sum sufficient to pay the principal and interest on said proposed new issue of bonds in the sum of \$25,000 as they respectively mature and become due, as per the following schedule, viz:

Whereas, the levying of said forced contribution or acreage tax is authorized by the Constitution and laws of Louisiana, and is absolutely essential and necessary for the proper completion of the drainage work in said District as originally outlined and as has become necessary since the drafting of said original plans; therefore, be it now

Resolved, by the Board of Commissioners of the Bayou Plaquemine Drainage District of the parish of St. Landry, La., that for the purpose of completing the system of gravity drainage outlined for said District, as hereinabove detailed in the preamble hereof, there be issued the bonds of said Drainage District in the sum of Twenty-five Thousand (\$25,000) Dollars, under authority of paragraph two (2) of Article 281 of the Constitution of Louisiana of the year 1913, and Act 90 of the General Assembly of Louisiana of the year 1916; said issue to consist of fifty (50) bonds of the denomination of Five Hundred (\$500) Dollars each, numbered consecutively from one (1) to fifty (50), both inclusive, dated as of the first day of July, A. D. 1921, due and payable one thousand (\$1000) dollars on July 1, in each of the years 1921, to 1925, both inclusive; fifteen hundred (\$15000) dollars on July 1, in each of the years 1926 to 1932, both inclusive; two thousand (\$2000) dollars on July 1, in each of the years 1933 to 1936, both inclusive; and two thousand, five hundred (\$2500) dollars on July 1, 1937, and bearing interest at the rate of five per centum (5) per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of January and the first day of July in each year, the several installments of interest to be evidenced by coupons attached to said bonds, and both principal and interest shall be payable in gold coin of the United States of America of the present standard of weight and fineness at the Chase National Bank in the City of New York, State of New York, or at the office of the Treasurer of said Drainage District, at Opelousas, La., at the option of the holder of said bonds. Be it further

Resolved, that said bonds shall be executed in substantially the following form, viz:

Know all men by these presents: That the Bayou Plaquemine Drainage District of the parish of St. Landry, Louisiana, for value received, is indebted to and promises to pay to bearer the sum of Five Hundred Dollars on the first day of July, 19-- with interest thereon from the date hereof at the rate of five per centum per annum payable semi-annually on the first day of January and July in each year, on presentation and surrender of the proper coupons hereto attached, bearing a fac-simile of the signature of the

Secretary of the Board of Commissioners of said Drainage District, as they severally become due. Both principal and interest of this bond are payable in gold coin of the United States of America of the present standard of weight and fineness, at the Chase National Bank in the City of New York, State of New York, or at the office of the Treasurer of said Drainage District, at Opelousas, La., at the option of the holder of said

Secretary. On the back of each of said bonds shall be printed the following certificate, required by Section 7, of Act 90 of the General Assembly of Louisiana of the year 1916, viz: Incontestable. Secured by Tax. Registered this -- day of (Seal) Secretary of State.

Resolved, that for the purposes of paying the principal and interest of said bonds as it accrues, there shall be levied and collected annually, and there is hereby levied, a forced contribution or acreage tax, in excess of all other taxes, of twelve (12) cents per acre per annum, commencing with the year 1921 and ending with the year 1937, upon each of the 19,412 acres of land embraced within the limits of said Drainage District, and sufficient to pay such interest semi-annually, and the principal falling due each year. Be it further,

Resolved, that the president and secretary of the Board of Commissioners of said Drainage District are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute said bonds as herein provided, and to affix thereto the corporate seal of said Drainage District. Be it further

Resolved, that the secretary of the Board is hereby authorized and directed to cause a certified copy of the proceedings of the Board authorizing the issuance of said bonds, and the levy of said forced contribution or acreage tax to pay the same, to be published and promulgated in two consecutive issues of the official journal of the parish of St. Landry, Louisiana, and thereafter to cause the same to be recorded in the Mortgage Records of the parish of St. Landry, Louisiana, and to be registered with the Secretary of State of Louisiana, who shall also be furnished with a copy of said official journal containing a publication of these proceedings.

Adopted, June 22d, 1921.

The above resolution was duly read in full and considered in open session and adopted by unanimous vote of the Board.

There being no further business before the Board, the same was on motion duly seconded and carried, adjourned.

BELLEVUE STREET STILL BLOCKED BUT WILL BE OPEN TO TRAFFIC SHORTLY

Bellevue street, at the corner of Market, is still blocked to traffic owing to the wood-cutting operations going on that corner. But it is expected that the work of cutting the trees will be finished within a few days and the street open again to travel.

Many cords of fine firewood have already been cut from the fallen giants and there are still many cords yet to be split by the sharp axes of the several workmen engaged on the job. Charles W. plete drainage work already undertaken, and to perfect the same when eighty per cent of the original work has already been completed, as is the case with the original drainage plans of the aforesaid Drainage District; and Whereas, it will require not less than the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand (\$25,000) Dollars to perfect and complete the drainage work in the aforesaid District; and

Whereas, an acreage tax or forced contribution of twelve (12) cents per acre per annum on each of the 19,412 acres of land embraced within the limits of said District, running over a period of sixteen (16) years, will be sufficient to raise the aforesaid sum of \$25,000 required for the proper completion of the drainage work aforesaid; and

Whereas, the Board of Commissioners of said District have given due notice of its intention to levy said forced contribution or acreage tax of twelve cent per acre per annum for said period of sixteen years on all of the land embraced within the limits of said District, said notice having been published in the St. Landry Clarion, the official journal of the parish of St. Landry, La., more than ten (10) days prior to the adoption of this ordinance, as required by Section One (1) of Act 90 of the General Assembly of Louisiana of the year 1916; and

Whereas, the Board of State Engineers of the State of Louisiana in conformity with the provisions of Section two (2) of said Act 90 of 1916, has made an estimate of the work already completed within the limits of said drainage District, and have affirmatively determined that eighty (80) per cent of said original drainage work has been completed and accomplished and have further advised and recommended the extent of work necessary to complete the system of drainage aforesaid; and have further advised that bonds to the extent of \$25,000 additional should be issued for the

A Resolution

Whereas, the Bayou Plaquemine Drainage District of the parish of St. Landry, Louisiana, has been duly created in conformity with the laws of Louisiana by ordinance of the police jury of the parish of St. Landry, La., adopted August 2, 1915; and ordinances amendatory thereof; and

Whereas, said Drainage District, according to an official survey thereof comprises a total area of Nineteen Thousand, Four Hundred and Twelve (19,412) acres; and

Whereas, the Board of Commissioners of said Drainage District were duly authorized by a majority vote, in numbers and amount, of the resident taxpayers of said District to issue negotiable bonds in the sum of Eighty-seven Thousand, Five Hundred (\$87,500) Dollars, at an election held within said District on the 1th day of February, A. D. 1919; and

Whereas, the work contemplated for the drainage of said district was promptly undertaken and diligently prosecuted until more than eighty (80) per centum thereof has already been completed; and

Whereas, there yet remains approximately twenty (20) per centum of the original work outlined yet to be completed, as well as considerable work not included in the original plans and estimates, but which said latter work is absolutely essential and necessary in order to afford proper and adequate drainage for said district, and to make beneficial and serviceable the work already done, and without which said additional work, not included in the aforesaid original plans, the work already completed would be lacking in its fullest efficiency and benefit of said district; and

Whereas, paragraph two (2) of Article 281 of the Constitution of Louisiana of 1913, as amended by Act 192 of the General Assembly of Louisiana of the year 1914 submitting said amendment to the people of Louisiana, which said amendment was duly adopted by vote of the qualified electors of the state of Louisiana, and Act 90 of the General Assembly of Louisiana of the year 1916 carrying out the terms of said paragraph two (2) of Article 281 of the Constitution aforesaid, provide that the Board of Commissioners of drainage districts may, without submission to a vote of the taxpayers, levy additional taxes in the form of forced contribution or acreage taxes not exceeding fifty (50) cents per acre per year when the same is necessary to com-
