SEVERAL CANDIDATES WANT HIGH COURT JOBS

A special election will be held in the lower supreme court district a month hence to fill the two vacancies on the bench occasioned by the voluntary retirement of Chief Justice Frank A. Monroe and Associate Justice W. B. Sommerville.
For the Monroe seat ex-Governor Hall, J. Zach Spearing, Judge E. Goudchard and Harry Gamble are aspirants, while for the Sommerville succession Judge J. G. Baker of the Orleans criminal court and Judge John St. Paul of the civil court of appeal have announced.
The nominating primary will be held on August 29 and the registration books in the district are now closed. Approximately thirty-nine thousand voters have registered in the parish of Orleans. There are several of the adjoining parishes in the supreme court district.

FARMERS MAKE LITTLE HEADWAY IN HARVEST OF EARLY PROLIFIC IS REPORT

The harvest of the Early Prolific rice has started in a spasmodic way through many sections of the belt but owing to the almost daily rains little headway is being made with the work.
Eunice reported this week that harvesting had gotten under way there, the date marking two weeks earlier than last year. In the district around Rayne and Crowley many fields of Early Prolific are ready but the wet weather is not only interfering with the harvest but threatening damage to the grain itself.
A gentleman from Bayou Boeuf, this parish stated Tuesday that the acreage in rice on the bayou was greater this year than ever before, due to the fact that several parties from this section proper had purchased land up there and planted it to rice. The crop he said, was considered fine by those who are capable of judging. Some fields were ready to cut but the farmers were confronted with the same conditions as face those in the prairie region, namely, too much rain.
