CHARTER OF THE EVANGELINE MOSS AND TRADING CO., INC.

State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Landry.

Be it known, that on this 18th day of the month of July, in the year of Our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Twenty-one, before me, H. D. LARCADE, JR., a Notary Public, duly commissioned, qualified and sworn in and for the parish and state above written, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared the several persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who declared that availing themselves of the laws of the state of Louisiana, and especially of Act No. 267 of the General Assembly for the year 1914, they have covenanted and agreed, and do by these presents hereby covenant, agree and bind themselves, as well as such other persons as may hereafter become associated with them, to form a corporation for the objects and purposes, and under the stipulations, articles, limitations and conditions following, to-wit:

The title and name of this corporation shall be the EVANGELINE MOSS AND TRADING CO., INC., and by that name it shall have power and authority to exist and enjoy succession for the full period of ninety-nine years from this day and date.

The domicile of this corporation shall be in the city of Opelousas, St. Landry parish, Louisiana. All citations shall be served upon the President of this corporation, or in his absence upon the Vice-President, and in case of the absence of both the President and Vice-President, then upon the Secretary-Treasurer of the corporation.

The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized and nature of the business to be carried on by it, are declared to be as follows, to-wit: The gathering, buying, cleaning, curing and the selling of moss; to own and operate moss signs, storage rooms and warehouses; to own and operate factories or machinery to manufacture moss into its various marketable forms; to acquire the ownership and control of trade marks, designs and formulas for the cleaning, curing, manufacturing and selling of moss; to buy and sell hides, wool, hosiery, furs, eggs, chickens and country produce; to manufacture, buy and sell corn, oats, hay, feed and feed products; to acquire, build, lease, sell, exchange and otherwise dispose of immovable or personal property incidental, necessary or advantageous to the successful and proper carrying on of the business of this corporation.

The Capital Stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of SIX THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$6000.00), divided into and represented by sixty (60) shares of the par value of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) each. The subscriptions to the Capital Stock shall be paid for in cash, property or rights actually transferred to the corporation, or for services actually rendered to the corporation, and this corporation shall only commence business when fifty per cent of the Capital Stock shall have been subscribed and fully paid for. The Capital Stock of this corporation may be increased to \$10,000.00 on complying with the requisites of the law.

All powers of this corporation shall be vested in and exercised by a Board of Directors to be composed of four stockholders, three of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of all business. The Board shall elect from among their number a President, Vice-President, and a Secretary-Treasurer, and such other officers as they may think proper or convenient for the carrying on of the business of the corporation, and shall have power to unite two or more offices and the same to confer upon one person, and to fix the salaries of all officers and agents of the corporation. The Board of Directors of this corporation shall be elected annually on the first Tuesday of July of each year, beginning in the year 1922. All such elections shall be by ballot at the office of the corporation. Notice of the annual meeting of the stockholders of this corporation as well as special meetings of the stockholders, shall be given by written notice mailed ten days in advance of the date of the meeting to each and every stockholder of record on the books of the corporation. Each stockholder shall be entitled to one vote for each and every share of stock standing in his name on the books of the corporation, said vote to be in person or by written proxy, and an absolute majority of all shares voted at an election shall be necessary for a decision. Failure of the stockholders to meet as herein provided shall not work a forfeiture of this charter but the directors and officers then in office shall hold over until their successors are elected and qualified. Until the annual meeting to be held in the year 1922, or until resignation the Board of Directors shall consist of the following: Jake Meyers, address, Lafayette, La. Sam Ostrovsky, address, Opelousas, Louisiana.

J. A. Haas, address, Opelousas, La. Allen Dezaucha, address, Opelousas, Louisiana. and of the foregoing Jake Meyers shall be president; Sam Ostrovsky shall be vice-president, and Allen Dezaucha shall be secretary-treasurer.

In the event of the death or resignation of any officer or director, the remaining directors by a majority vote of those in office may choose his successor who shall serve until the next annual election, or until his successor shall have been elected.

No stockholder shall ever be held liable for the contracts or faults of this corporation in any further sum than the unpaid balance due by him on the shares of stock owned by him; nor shall any informality in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null, or expose any stockholder to liability beyond the amount due on his stock subscription.

If this corporation be dissolved either by limitation or other cause, its affairs shall be liquidated by three commissioners to be appointed at a general meeting of the stockholders called for that purpose. The said liquidators shall remain in office until the affairs of the corporation shall have been fully settled and liquidated. In case of the death, resignation or disability of one of the liquidators the vacancy shall be filled by the survivors.

In order that this charter may also serve as the original subscription list, the subscribers hereto have written opposite their names the number of shares subscribed for by them, and their post office addresses.

Derbes and Arthur Lagdry, competent witnesses, who have signed these presents together with the appearers and me, Notary, after due reading of the whole.

INTERSTATE FARM CONGRESS TO BE HELD NEXT MONTH Cotton planters visiting the Interstate Farm Congress, September 12, 17, will be interested in motion pictures and lectures on boll weevil poison, to be given by the expert in charge of the Delta experiment station. This is just one of the many educational features arranged for what is expected to be the greatest gathering of farmers ever held in the south.

The thousands of cotton farmers who are summoned here to discuss ways and means for developing a chain of warehouses in which to keep their crop while awaiting higher prices, will find these demonstrations especially profitable. "Better prices and bigger crops" is quite a promise, but those who are behind the Interstate Farm congress say this is one promise that will be made good. The warehouse idea is founded on the belief that no cotton farmer would sacrifice his crop if he could get enough money to run himself. Most of the cotton is now thrown upon the market shortly after it is harvested, and the price suffers. Later on, it rises, and speculators and others who had warehouse space, reap the real profit of the sweat of the farmers' brow. Under the proposed system, the cotton would be graded and

valued and the farmer would get a negotiable warehouse receipt. Then he would sell the cotton at the market price of the time when the cotton goes into consumption through the mills.

This is only one phase of the congress. Another will be the development of better marketing conditions to vegetables, which would mean lower prices to the consumer and higher prices to the farmer. This sounds like a paradox but it isn't. Retail prices are high because a poor distribution system has been developed. A poor distribution system has been developed because the farmers don't and ship in sufficient volume to have a voice in fixing the prices. And they don't pack quality goods.

All these weaknesses are to be discussed by an imposing group of experts, and the remedies are to be pointed out. Better relations are to be developed between the farmers and the middlemen.

The railroads have cut round trip rates 25 per cent. Here is how to take advantage of the reduction. Buy a ticket to New Orleans, and take a receipt from the agent. Then register at the Interstate Farm congress headquarters, and you will be given a certificate which, upon being presented at the ticket office here, will entitle you to a ticket back home at half fare.

Hotel rates will be on the dollar-a-day basis, it is announced, for those attending the congress. The delegates badge will secure this rate.

Big Drive in Search Of Disabled Veterans

By J. C. BARNES Hey, buddy! Did you get hit with a stray bullet while sojourning in France? Did the flu force you to do some unwelcome bunk fatigue and leave your pumps in a rotten condition? Did you slice your index finger off while carving spuds for the royal chef while on K. P. detail? Did you inhale some of the German gas, sweat that you would only puff and never inhale again? If any of these things happened to you while wearing the old O. D. and doing twelve to twenty-four hours a day for thirty per and "chow" and you find that since going back to the old job that you sorta have to dodge the boss to hold on, or if he has caught you at it and let you go and now you find that if you are lucky enough to get a job that you can't hold it; why, you are the chap that your Uncle Sam is looking for.

Do you know that if you were wounded or disabled to such an extent that you can't carry-on in the old job that you are entitled to compensation and vocation training? Did you ever hear of the bureau of war risk insurance or the federal board for vocational rehabilitation? Well, these are the two might big governmental bureaus that are working night and day trying to find chaps like you that had a little hard luck while in the service and to give you what your country has provided for you.

Colonel C. R. Forbes, director of the bureau of war risk insurance, has instructed all his fourteen district managers throughout the United States to put on an intensive clean-up drive which will last about three months in order to comb the country for fellows just like you men, who have a disability as a result of their service in the world war and who do not know that they are entitled to aid.

Colonel Dallas B. Smith, the new district manager of District No. 6, with headquarters at the United States mint building, at New Orleans has organized three clean up squads which will start work some time after the 20th of August. One squad will work Alabama, one Louisiana and one Mississippi. There will be an advance man who will go ahead of the squad about one week and who will advertise the coming of the squad through the press, by posters, hand bills, American Legion posts, churches, Rotary and Kiwanis clubs, chambers of commerce, postmasters, Red Cross chapters, a devery available medium in order to get the good work to all the boys that may have a claim against their Uncle Sammie. So if you were lucky and came out better than you went in and know some guy that didn't come out "Jake" you look up your buddy, and tell him all about this clean-up squad and what they intend to do. They will help him file his claim for compensation or for vocational training, and if he is sick

there will be a competent doctor on the squad who will examine him and if he has never filed a claim for compensation, he will help him file it and he will then give him transportation and send him to one of Uncle Sam's hospitals for treatment and keep him there until he is well.

Isn't that a fine thing? That is what the clean-up squad is going to do. So it's up to you and all the old gang that wore the khaki, the blue and the white to help find the chap that came out in a bad way and get him fixed up. Talk to your Red Cross chapter, your American Legion post, your postmaster, your chamber of commerce, your minister; ask them—they all know about it. Read the papers, they are going to keep you informed, watch them closely for the itinerary telling you just when the squad is going to be in your town or parish. Watch for the big red posters on the telephone poles and the little red hand bills telling you all about it.

Uncle Sam wants to find every man that has a claim against him so that he can pay the claim, and if you haven't a claim you can help Uncle Sam just as you used to, by going out and finding the chap that has the claim and by telling him of the clean-up squad that is coming to help him.
