Principal Causes of Death

Washington, D. C., Oct. 22.—The department of commerce announces that the census bureau's annual report on mortality statistics, which will be issued shortly, shows 1,142,578 deaths as having occurred in 1920 within the death registration area of continental United States, representing a death rate of 13.1 per 1,000 population as compared with 12.9 in 1919, which was the lowest rate recorded in any year since the registration area was established in 1900.

The death registration area (exclusive of the Territory of Hawaii) in 1920 comprised 34 states, the District of Columbia and 16 registration cities in nonregistration states, with a total estimated population on July 1st. of 37,486,713 or 32.2 per cent of the estimated population of the United States. The state of Nebraska was added to the registration

area in 1920, so that at present the only states not in the area are Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Georgia, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Iowa, Nevada, New Mexico, Montana, Texas, West Virginia, and Wyoming. The figures for the territory of Hawaii will appear in the report, but they are not included in this summary.

The death rate from pneumonia increased from 123.5 per 100,000 in 1919 to 137.3 in 1920. From chronic diseases of the heart the rate increased from 131.0 to 141.9; from cancer, from 80.5 to 83. Some of the other diseases for which the rate increased are whooping cough, measles, cerebral hemorrhage, congenital debility and malformations, purpural fever, scarlet fever, and ppendicitis. The fatalities caused by automobile accidents and injuries show an increase from 9.4 per 100,000 in 1919 to 10.4 in 1920.

A market decrease is shown in the death rate from tuberculosis, which was 114.2 in 1920 as compared with 125.6 in 1919; also in the death rate from influenza, 71.0 in 1920 as against 98.9 the year before. The death rate from suicide declined from 11.4 in 1919 to 16.2 in 1920. There was a decline also in the rate for typhoid fever and in that for accidental drownings.

YOUR TOWN ON THIS ROUTE LIST

Here Are Places New Road System Will Include

Baton Rouge, La., Oct. 20.—Is your town written there—on one of the routes of the new, great state highway system proposed in the house substitute road bill, drawn by J. S. Douglas, adopted in committee and reported into the House, Wednesday?

What everyone wanted to know: "Am I on a route?" There was no extra copies of the bill and Mr. Douglas moved that 1,000 copies be printed at once. "Everybody wants one."

The bill tracks the Boykin measure and absorbs good features of all the numerous other bills. It provides for a commission of three, appointed by the governor from the state at large, with power to select its highway engineer and other officials.

Commissioners are for overlapping terms, two, four, and six years and they are to receive \$6,000 salary. The bill carries an appropriation of \$7,500,000, of which \$2,500,000 is appropriated for the balance of this year and \$5,000,000 for next year. Here are the routes:
