GRAND CHAMPION PIG SHOWN BY CLUB GIRL

There are several thousand boys enrolled in the big clubs throughout the state, and only a few girls, but Mary Barham, of Morehouse parish, won the grand championship of the pig club show at the state fair with a Hampshire junior sow pig, while Russel Daniel of St. Francisville, won first prize in all of the four entries of the Duorc-Jersey classes. M. M. LeCroix, is in charge of swine work, and head of the pig club department at the fair, while E. L. Jordan, professor of animal industry, Louisiana state university, is the judge of both adult and pig club classes.

The four agricultural experiment stations, Crowley, Calhoun, Audubon and Baton Rouge, together with the extension department, of the Louisiana state university, have the largest and most varied exhibits ever placed on display in the agricultural building; according to George L. Tiebout, L. S. U. horticulturist and superintendent of the combined exhibits. Specimens of the leading varieties of pecans, Schley, Stuart, Success, Pabst and Honeymaker, all grown in

Louisiana, are on display by B. Szymoniak, assistant horticulturist of the university extension department, various types of sprayers, pruning devices, an dalso nursery stock furnished by the Jennings nurseries. Mr. Szymoniak also has several specimens of pecan grafting, demonstrating how worthless trees can be turned into valuable ones by grafting with good stock. These are the property of A. P. Jackson, of Shreveport.

The horticultural department of the experiment station and extension division has charts showing the value of Louisiana horticultural crops, which, according to the 1920 census, amounted to \$22,000,000. Farm gardens show a value of about \$7,000,000, or \$51 per farm, which amount should be doubled, says Mr. Tiebout.

Growers of Irish potatoes are being chiefly attracted by the display of certified seed having a low percentage of mosaic disease, which causes thousands of dollars of damage to the potato crop each year. There are eight of the leading strains of certified Triumph seed from Wisconsin and three from Nebraska. Specimens of the Triumph, Irish Cobbler and Splashing Rose No. 4, grown at the experiment station last spring show the value of planting certified seed.

Home Grown Seed Best Prof. A. F. Kidder, of the Baton Rouge experiment station is featuring Patterson Rustproof oats, showing that it pays to use seed grown in the state for the best results. An experiment showing the maturing of soy beans planted in March, April, May and July, all of which matured at the same time, with the exception that the earlier planting made a more prolific growth, while those planted later were more heavily fruited. The Calhoun exhibit of various

farm crops is in charge of G. D. Cain, while J. M. Jenkins of Crowley is featuring the five new varieties of rice grown at the Crowley station. They are the Acadia, Tokalon, Delius, Vintula and Fortuna.

Various pictures showing the injury, and the best type of cornrib to July done to grain by the corn weevil, is exhibited by T. H. Jones of the department of entomology, and Dr. C. W. Edgerton of the department of pathology is showing specimens and pictures of the tomato wilt disease, as well as diseased straw-berries and the mosaic disease of the Irish potato.

E. M. Barber of the federal department of entomology of the New Orleans experiment station is showing plants susceptible to the newly-discovered camphor scale that is causing thousands of dollars loss in the vicinity of New Orleans, also how to control the cotton cushion scale and the Argentine ant. The various methods of syrup clarification are brought out by several jars of syrup from the sugar experiment station.

No one passes the sweet potato exhibit, which is in charge of M. Hull of the horticultural department, without asking him to explain the wonderful growth of the potato industry during the past few years, and the methods of curing and shipping to distant markets.
