Licenses for the Year 1879.

1. From each wholesale and retail mer-
chant, dealer or trader; from each im-
porter or dealer in bar stores; from every
coffeehouse keeper, bar room, grog shop,
beer saloon or cabaret, the sum of fifty
dollars.

2. From each keeper of a warehouse, or
lumber yard, ten dollars.

3. From each keeper of a livery stable or
feed stable, with stalls or other accom-
modations for less than fifty heads of
horses or mules, ten dollars; from any
public hack, dray, or other vehicle drawn
by one horse or mule, five dollars; from
every public carriage, stage, dray, truck,
wagon, boat, or other vehicle, drawn by
two or more horses or mules, eight dollars;
to be paid by the proprietors thereof.

4. From each keeper or proprietor of a
brewery or distillery, one hundred dollars.

5. From each proprietor of a billiard
saloon, or bowling alley, in which there is
but one table or alley, twelve dollars;
where there is more than one table or
alley, five dollars for each additional table
or alley.

6. From each keeper of a cotton press,
or pickery, ten dollars; provided, that no
cotton gin on a plantation and established
for the sole and exclusive use of said plan-
tation shall be taxed.

7. From every fortune-teller, clairvoyant
or astrologer, one hundred dollars.

17. Every proprietor of a photographic
gallery, whether the same be on land or
water, shall pay as a license the sum of
ten dollars.

18. Every person having more than one
shop, store or establishment, or who shall
exercise or follow more than one profes-
sion, trade, calling, or business, shall pay
the tax on each separately; and each part-
ner of any firm in this parish, whether
active or silent, shall pay the license pre-
scribed by law.
